

RESULTS OF THE ANNUAL STATE FAIR POLL

HOUSE POLLS FAIRGOERS; SPLIT ON TAXING INTERNET SALES, FAVOR SUNDAY LIQUOR

The State House of Representatives' annual poll of fairgoers showed a dip in participation during the 2012 Minnesota State Fair. Last year, a record number of 12,500 people filled out the survey but this year's number was closer to 9,000.

Thirteen questions were on the survey this year. The most overwhelming vote on any question came with the very first one on the survey: "Should employers be allowed to require employees to provide their social media passwords as a condition of employment?" 92% of those surveyed responded with a resounding "no".

There was a mixed response to the question of whether internet sales should be taxed just as retail sales are. 47% of those surveyed felt that internet sales should be subject to state sales taxes, however 44% were against and 8% had no opinion.

A question of whether there should be an expansion of legal fireworks for consumer purchase met with a similar result: 47% said yes to legalizing "bottle rockets and firecrackers" in Minnesota and 45% said no. 7% had no opinion.

Other questions which received strong responses included one on whether liquor stores should be allowed to be open on Sundays. 63% said yes. This has been debated off and on for many years and was again brought up in the last legislative session. Many liquor store associations however are against the idea, citing that stores open on the seventh day would not derive any additional revenue benefit. Legislators from border cities have made this proposal with the aim of enhancing the sales tax revenues of those border cities, such as Duluth, Winona and Moorhead.

56% of respondents said they favor allowing school districts to start classes before Labor Day.

70% believe that motorcyclists should be required to wear a helmet.

85% said that Hmong and Lao-American veterans who fought on the U.S. side in the Vietnam War should be eligible for burial at the Minnesota State Veterans Cemetery near Camp Ripley.

72% favored laying off teachers by using performance reviews rather than by seniority.

Other questions included, "In child custody disputes, a parent is currently entitled to receive at least 25% of parenting time. Should each parent be guaranteed at least 45.1% of parenting time?" No — 45%; Yes — 27%; No opinion — 27%.

"Should companies that violate environment laws be ineligible for state tax breaks or subsidies?" — two-thirds said yes.

"Should the right to defend one's self be expanded so that an individual would no longer have a duty to retreat before using force, including lethal force, against an attacker in a public place?" No — 48%; Yes — 39%; No opinion — 13%.

53% said there should be a higher threshold than the current simple majority vote that is required in the House and Senate to place a constitutional amendment on the ballot. A specific new threshold was not posed in the question.

Poll questions are derived from past and future legislative proposals. Looking back to the 2011 fair poll, there was 50% support for Voter ID, 62% support for banning cell phone use while driving, 54% support for a right-to-work law. 62% were against imposing sales taxes on clothing and 66% were not supportive of what became the "marriage amendment" ballot question set for the 2012 general election. 51% said the state should allow an expansion of gambling to provide additional revenue to state government, and 62% supported government funding of pre-school for all children.

Just under 10,000 people were surveyed at the 2010 State Fair. 69% favored Voter ID, 60% favored lifting the moratorium on nuclear power plant construction, 72% were against school districts being able to extend operating levies without a voter referendum.

51% favored a ban on smoking inside a vehicle if a minor is an occupant of the vehicle.

Without specifics, a generic question, "do you support tax breaks or other funding assistance to encourage small-business growth?" met with an 80% response in the affirmative.

73% thought the legislature should limit tuition and fee increases at public colleges and universities.

When asked for their opinions on balancing the state's budget, 50% of those surveyed said a combination of increasing revenues and decreasing spending should be effected, while one-third of the respondents said there only needs to be a decrease in spending. 14% said there only needs to be an increase in revenue.

68% said automobile and liquor store sales should be allowed on Sundays.

62% approved creating a less stringent set of criteria for a limited teaching license.

66% were against the use of taxpayer funds to build a new Vikings stadium. (A stadium question was also on the 2009 survey, which asked if there should be a voter referendum if taxpayer funds were to be used for a stadium. 63% said yes. Over 8,700 people filled out surveys at the 2009 State Fair).

COON RAPIDS CITY COUNCIL TO FINALIZE CITY MANAGER CONTRACT

Steve Gatlin, Public Services Director for the city of Coon Rapids, has been named the new city manager by the city council. His contract and hiring is expected to be finalized at the Sept. 18 council meeting. Gatlin has been employed by the city since 1998, when he was hired as the Public Works Director.

Gatlin has been serving as the Acting City Manager since the resignation of Matt Fulton on July 18. (See *Anoka County Record*, Aug. 2 edition).

Below are excerpts from city staff's analysis and documentation for the council's review at their Sept. 11 and 18 meetings:

"In terms of compensation, City Council has asked for a comparison of compensation proposed in the Employment Agreement. The attached sheet provides an analysis of compensation based on Mr. Gatlin's current salary as Public Services Director, salary while serving as Acting City Manager, and proposed compensation as City Manager.

"The compensation package includes the following components:

- Base Salary - 2% over current base salary as Public Services Director
- Car Compensation - same compensation as provided as Public Services Director
- Deferred Compensation - employer pays amount similar to previous City Manager
- Dependent Health Insurance - employer pays amount similar to previous City Manager

The salary analysis attachment provides a brief discussion of the salary cap. City staff has reviewed the statute relating to salary cap and would note that the statute is very clear as to items that must be included in the salary cap compensation. These include base salary and deferred compensation. However, the statute is not clear in terms of what other items are excluded from the salary cap calculation. The City of Coon Rapids has excluded the City Manager's dependent health insurance payment from the salary cap. Car compensation for the City Manager and Public Services Director has also been excluded from the salary cap calculation."

"The City Attorney has reviewed State Statute, prior legal opinions, and court rulings on the compensation cap exclusion issue. It appears that the dependent health care payment by the City can be excluded from the salary cap. However, the car compensation as currently provided is not excluded. To avoid confusion and possible future salary cap issues, language has been added to the Employment Agreement that limits the total City Manager compensation to an amount no more than the State salary cap. For purposes of this analysis, it would be assumed that base salary, deferred compensation, and compensation for car expenses would all be included in the salary cap calculation. The employee would be given the option of reviewing the compensation package annually and selecting items to be included or adjusted as necessary to ensure compliance with the salary cap limitations."

“Council has also asked for comparisons of City Manager compensation of other municipalities. This information will be prepared by staff and made available to Council at the work session.”

“In addition to the City Manager salary analysis, staff has included the 2012 pay classification system. The current Public Services Director salary is set at Step 9, Grade 32. The proposed salary for the new City Manager would be Step 7, Grade 33. As outlined in the draft Employment Agreement, the proposed starting base salary would allow the new City Manager to receive salary raises in the future — similar to those granted to other full-time employees.”

“RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends Council review the draft City Manager Agreement at the work session along with proposed appointment as City Manager. It is recommended that both the Employment Agreement and the official appointment be made at the September 18, 2012 Council meeting with the appointment effective October 1, 2012.”

“BUDGET IMPACT:

Funding for the new City Manager’s employment compensation package is included in the 2012/2013 Budget.

Steve Gatlin’s proposed City Manager Compensation Package is \$2,160 (1.4%) less than Matt Fulton’s 2012 package.

Note: Current State salary cap is \$157,181. Historically, the dependent health insurance employer payment has not been included in salary cap calculations. The City Attorney has reviewed the Statute and believes car expenses should be treated as compensation and included in the salary cap calculations. Gatlin’s proposed compensation for salary cap calculations would be \$152,367 in 2012, which is 10.2% higher than his current 2012 compensation.

* This amount will cover the costs above the established Employee share to cover 100% of the costs for health insurance.”

11 STATE SENATORS FINED BY OAH FOR CAUCUS LITERATURE LACKING DISCLAIMER

The Office of Administrative Hearings of the State of Minnesota fined eleven Republican state senators and Steve Swiggum, Communications Director of the Senate Republican Caucus in a ruling dated August 31.

The complaint was made by the DFL party shortly after the February 7 Republican Party precinct caucuses. The complaint asserted that the literature distributed at the caucuses on behalf of the eleven office holders contained web links to the Minnesota Senate Republican Caucus (MNSRC) which is also known as the Senate Victory Fund.

This entity is not to be confused with the Senate Republican Caucus, which is the official state legislative office staffed with state employees. It was this office that prepared the senators’ literature under the supervision of Mr. Swiggum.

The senators’ literature was labeled a “legislative update” to caucus goers but Swiggum acknowledged that a mistake had been made by staff when MNSRC logos and web links made their way into the printed material.

Since the MNSRC is a campaign committee that raises funds to help elect Republican legislators, administrative law judges Barbara L. Neilson, Timothy J. O’Malley and Manuel J. Cervantes levied fines against those involved for not having the proper disclaimers on the literature.

By including references to the Senate Victory Fund and the MNSRC, the judges deemed it as campaign material which had been produced by an office that is operated with public funds.

The OAH’s findings showed that a number of staff, including Sviggum and Tom Bottem, Director of the Minnesota Senate Counsel, composed or proofread the material and yet no one caught the errors that led to the DFL complaint.

The findings also stated, “Other than making a few edits to the text, the individual Senators named in this Complaint did not prepare the Legislative Updates or coordinate the Updates with their campaign committees’ efforts. The Senators did, however, disseminate the Updates at their precinct caucuses.” The judges also referenced that the material was distributed at caucuses, which are “inherently political events”, contrasted against literature meant for the general public or the entire constituency of a legislator.

Civil penalties of \$75 each were made against Senators David Senjem, Al DeKruif, Benjamin Kruse, Gretchen Hoffman, Chris Gerlach, Michelle Fischbach, Ted Lillie, Ray Vandever, Pam Wolf, Claire Robling and John Pederson. Sviggum was fined \$200. Payments are due by November 30.

NEWSPAPER WINS ARGUMENT

WISCONSIN SUPREME COURT RULES IN PUBLIC INFORMATION CASE

The Wisconsin Supreme Court has made a unanimous decision against the City of Milwaukee over a public data complaint made by the city’s major newspaper, the Journal-Sentinel.

The court said the state’s public data law has never allowed government agencies to charge fees to public data requestors for redacting information from records. Two years ago, the newspaper had requested police records for a two-week period of time that reporters were investigating. The police department provided an initial batch for free but then informed the newspaper that to fulfill the remainder of its request, there would be a charge of thousands of dollars and many months needed to make the material available.

Advocates for transparency, such as the Madison chapter of the Society of Professional Journalists said that threatening requestors with fees to redact police records raises the question about the motives behind keeping such data out of the public eye.

The Journal-Sentinel’s investigations of police records stem from its findings of crimes that had been mis-reported, over-reported or not accurately classified, leading to skewed and inaccurate government reports of the city’s crime rates.

The Supreme Court’s ruling overturned a county judge’s earlier ruling. However, two justices, Patience D. Roggensack and David Prosser, said that the legislature needs to address this issue. Prosser said that public data requests can be used to “harass public officials or units of government. This reality is seldom acknowledged. The ability to impose charges reflecting the actual cost of compliance has sometimes served as a brake on malicious, frivolous, or unreasonable requests. To some extent, the court removes this brake.”

NOW WE KNOW HOW "LIBERAL" THE DFL PARTY REALLY IS

Whenever a political party is in the middle of a scandal, it's always interesting to watch their damage control tactics.

In Duluth recently there has been a series of whammys. Not only did a Duluth legislator get caught by police in a sex act with a minor, but that legislator's political party had a hard time finding a candidate to run as a surrogate in his place. When they finally found someone, his adult daughter complained to the press that she has never seen her father. He chose to walk away from his family when she was a toddler. He's kept up his support payments though, so he's not all bad.

We don't care so much about the details of these things but more interesting is the reaction by others to these chinks in the armor of the DFL in one of its stronghold areas, where the vote is usually 75 to 80% for the Democrats.

The party has little chance of losing a house seat here, however one of the write-in candidates is Jay Fosle, a Duluth city councilor in his second term. He has shown he is competent and a motivated campaigner.

Now let's backtrack to the beginning of this episode.

Rep. Kerry Gauthier, serving his first term in the House from the west end-Central Hillside area of Duluth, was caught by police having oral sex with a male who was a minor, aged 17, just this side of the age of consent. The rendezvous between the strangers was arranged on the internet. Their chosen location for the rendezvous is often patrolled by state troopers — a freeway rest stop outside of town. The incident occurred Sunday, July 22, however the full story of what happened was not made public for three weeks.

The Duluth News Tribune's request for public data was denied by authorities on Aug. 8. The reason given was that it was an ongoing criminal investigation. The newspaper contended that the police report should have been public as soon as it was written. Its early reporting on the story was limited to phrases like "suspicious incident" without being able to give details.

The Duluth Police was also accused by The Court of Public Opinion of dragging its heels in bringing the matter to the county attorney.

Rep. Peggy Scott (R-Andover), a state legislator who chairs a subcommittee on data practices, wrote a letter, which we publish here in its entirety, to the Duluth police chief asking about these questions and whether the information about the incident was withheld for partisan reasons and/or to protect a public figure. Scott's letter asks if a suspect was not a public figure and just an ordinary citizen, would the police have complied with the public data request?

When the media was able to report all of the investigation's details, the onslaught really started. Not in recent memory has there been such a firestorm of vitriol thrown upon an elected official by people in his own political party. I don't think even Nixon had it this bad. The chair of the DFL made threats that they would find another candidate to run for Gauthier's seat this November. (Gauthier had filed for re-election).

Gauthier was figuratively stoned to death. It seemed that the entire DFL leadership and fellow legislators had nasty things to say and were beating the tom-toms. The strangest, most surprising bromides made by elected officials about the incident came from fellow DFL and Duluth House member Rep. Tom Huntley and Governor Dayton.

Huntley called Gauthier "a child molester" and made no bones about it. He said it loudly. When reporter Mary Lahammer of KTCA's "Almanac" program interviewed Huntley after this outburst, he was a little sheepish to say it again one more time for the camera. Dayton made remarks at a press conference about Gauthier's "morals".

Another shocker came on the same "Almanac" show: guest Wy Spano, one of the most ultra-left wingers of the Minnesota Democrats, stated without missing a beat, that Gauthier should resign his seat. Every guest on the couch agreed.

The point here is the Democrats are not very liberal when the chips are down.

They are not very liberal, even to their own brethren, when it's election season.

If the Gauthier sex incident happened in July 2013, not an election year, the DFL would have taken a completely different tack. The message would have been a very liberal one with words like forgiveness, diversity, privacy, respect and all the other politically correct buzzwords. The matter would have been forgotten in a week.

Letter from Rep. Peggy Scott, chair of the Minnesota House Data Practices Subcommittee, to Duluth Police Chief Gordon Ramsay

As Chair of the Minnesota House Data Practices Subcommittee, I am deeply disturbed at remarks made by the Duluth Police Department concerning access to data related to the investigation of Rep. Kerry Gauthier. Despite the obvious requirements set forth in Chapter 13, your department appears to have violated the law in order to avoid disclosing public data related to this investigation.

News reports indicate that your department twice failed to comply with requests for public data related to the Gauthier investigation. The Deputy Chief, Robin Roesser, explained that this is because it maintains public data on "high profile" individuals, including incident and arrest reports, separate and apart from other data. Deputy Roesser is quoted as saying, "It's a database shared by several law enforcement agencies. It was a high-profile case, shielded so only a few users could see it."

This is highly inappropriate, and a clear violation of the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act. By restricting access to public data related the incidents involving "high profile" individuals, the Duluth Police Department has created two sets of rules for handling public data. For regular people, requests for data will be processed according to the rules of Chapter 13. For "high-profile" people, the police will decide which data to release and when to release it.

The actions and statements of your department beg for clarification of which statutes, rules or ordinances allow a policy of "special treatment" of privileged individuals. Under Chapter 13, I am hereby requesting the following information and data:

1. The department's definition of "high profile" and its procedure in determining whether certain incidents or investigations are "high profile."
2. The records retention schedule for government data required under Sec. 138.17. Indicate where in the records retention schedule, or in another authority, a government entity is authorized to deem an individual "high profile" and provide disparate treatment for data related to that person.
3. Clarification of Deputy Roesser's comments describing data on "high profile" individuals being held separate from all other data. Does the Duluth Police Department segregate and/or restrict access to physical or electronic data on what it deems "high profile" individuals that, in whole or part, is public?
 - a. What led the Duluth Police Department to determine that this practice is necessary, and for how long has this been a common practice?
 - b. How long after the Duluth Police Department comes into possession of data on "high profile" individuals does the department restrict access to that data?
 - c. Identify any individuals involved in developing and maintaining the practice of restricting access to public "high profile" individuals.
4. If so, which officers or employees of the Duluth Police Department have access to "high profile" data? Which other law enforcement agencies have access to this data?
5. All data related to any individual reported to, arrested by, or investigated by the Duluth Police Department, who was deemed to be "high profile" by the department or another law enforcement agency at any time from 2006 to present.
6. The number of reports of indecent exposure or activities similar to Rep. Gauthier's alleged behavior from 2006 to present.
7. The number of citations issued to and/or arrests made of individuals accused of the behavior identified in (6) from 2006 to present.

According to Sec. 13.03, you have a reasonable amount of time to respond to this request. Should you find it easier to respond to the information sought in requests (1) – (4), feel free to provide that information in advance of responses to the remaining requests.

Please contact my office as soon as possible with a cost estimate for reproducing the data. Depending on the estimate, I may wish to inspect the data at your department. Also, please let me know if you would like clarification on the information being sought, or if we can be of assistance in facilitating the fulfillment of this request.

STATUTORY FACTS

121A.11 UNITED STATES FLAG.

Subdivision 1. Displayed by schools.

Every public school in Minnesota must display an appropriate United States flag when in session. The flag shall be displayed upon the school grounds or outside the school building, on a proper staff, on every legal holiday occurring during the school term and at such other times as the board of the district may direct. The flag must be displayed within the principal rooms of the school building at all other times while school is in session.

Subd. 2. School boards to provide flags and staffs. The board must provide the flag for each of the school buildings in their districts, together with a suitable staff to display the flag outside of the school building and proper arrangement to display the flag in the building, and a suitable receptacle for the safekeeping of the flag when not in use.
