

## MAYORS' PAY SHOULD BE BASED ON DUTIES, NOT EQUITY

No two Mayors are alike.

Recently the Star Tribune did an article on mayor and council pay. (Pay raises for mayors, council members vary widely among cities: Star Tribune, July 26, 2014.)

It was unclear why this is an issue since city elected officials are some of the lowest paid elected officials in the state. The Anoka County Board payroll is over \$400,000 a year which is probably greater than the salaries of all mayors and council members in the county combined. Apparently the outrageous \$150,000+ salary and benefit packages that city administrators and other senior managers receive are not an issue either.

Getting back to the article: What has been a problem with this and other articles over the years is the belief that it's terrible that pay for local elected officials varies from city to city. It seems that many think that just because two people carry the title of Mayor, they must do the exact same job. For example, the Star Tribune noted that Mayor Tom Ryan of Blaine is asking for a pay raise and his city is the same size as Saint Cloud which pays their mayor a lot more money. Mayor Ryan of Blaine makes \$1,100 a month while Mayor Dave Kleis of Saint Cloud makes \$4,200 a month.

The article implies that this is somehow inequitable. Mayor Ryan claims to work full-time at the job, and Mayor Kleis is considered a full-time mayor also. Well just because the two carry the title of Mayor, doesn't mean they have the same job description or responsibilities.

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## PETITION SUCCESSFUL IN COL HTS \$7 million in borrowing for library project will be on general election ballot

A petition calling to reverse a decision by the Columbia Heights City Council to borrow up to seven million dollars for a new city library was delivered to the city clerk in the afternoon of July 28th.

The effort required 1,010 valid signatures from the city's electorate, a figure that represents 10% of those who voted in the last municipal election (which was the general election of 2012). (A minimum of 700 signatures is required by the city charter, or the 10% figure, whichever is greater).

There was some confusion as to when the actual deadline for the petition was because three different dates were bandied about.

The city charter says an ordinance passed by the city council takes effect 30 days after passage. The city council voted 4-1 at its June 23 meeting to borrow up to \$7 million cash for the library project. 30 days from passage, with Tuesday the 24th counted as the first day, would have put the 30th day as Wednesday, July 23.

During the July 14 city council meeting, city attorney James Hoeft said the deadline was Thursday, July 24. Later, according to petition organizers, Hoeft told them the 30 days started after publication of the ordinance in the city's legal newspaper — which would have made the deadline Monday, July 28. (The legal notice was published Friday, June 27th.) Not taking anything to chance, the petition group delivered the majority of their collected signatures on July 23, with the remainder on July 28.

At press time, Greg Sloat of the citizens' petition group, told the *Record* that 1,039 signatures had been verified by the City Clerk Katie Bruno, which would make the petition sufficient. A final figure had yet to be released.

Only hours after the last signatures were delivered, the Columbia Heights City Council had its regularly scheduled meeting, during which City Attorney Hoeft said the signature verifications and final determinations would be completed before the next council meeting August 11. At that meeting, the council will deliberate whether to take a vote to rescind the ordinance it passed, or let the petition process proceed.

Hoeft said that Anoka County needs the necessary details and ballot language by August 22. Councilor Bruce Nawrocki asked the city clerk as to how many signatures were turned in. The answer came back as 1,371.

Mayor Gary Peterson read aloud a letter from a citizen who complained after signing the petition, that "I had been led to believe that it was for more funding for a new library . . . my signature was collected in a fraudulent fashion and at no point was I shown the actual petition." The complainant said he wanted his signature removed from the petition, charging there was an effort by the signature collector to "deliberately mislead."

City attorney Hoeft said, "I don't want to take the step, at this point in time, to indicate that anybody deliberately misled anybody in signing the petition." He went on to say that even the council often can get confused at meetings when going over ordinances, "and

what they mean by a Yes or a No."

Nawrocki said he saw the petition "and it seemed pretty clear to me what they (the petition group) were asking for. I find it hard to believe that someone could have misconstrued what it said, that is, if they had bothered to read it."

(Each signature sheet is required to have a written

statement that explains the objective of the petition. The language is approved by the city attorney before the petition can be circulated. Anyone signing the petition has to do so on an official signature sheet for the signature to be verified further.)

Voters will be asked on Nov. 4 whether they approve or disapprove of the city council's action to borrow \$7 million for the \$13 million library project.

These numbers come straight from Minnesota Management and Budget, the state's official agency for fiscal matters.

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## INSIDE THE COLUMBIA HEIGHTS PETITION DRIVE FED-UP TAXPAYERS READY TO UNDO CITY COUNCIL SPENDING IN FALL ELECTION

COLUMBIA HEIGHTS, Minn. — “Tim’s got a mini-van with a sliding door inside, so we’d drive around with the doors open like riding in a Huey chopper in Viet Nam,” said Gregory Sloat, a ringleader in a petition drive that broke out over a \$9 million to \$10 million library approved by the Columbia Heights City Council. “We’d see somebody, we’d just jump out and give them our spiel.”

Their target voting bloc: Disenfranchised taxpayers.

“The vast majority were receptive. We got very few people that were hostile. And those were just a handful of people that just didn’t want to have anything to do with politics, and the other end of it, where they wanted the library no matter what,” said Adam Davis, a music teacher and one of five members of the opponent’s organizing committee.

Their mission: Give voters the final say on expensive city projects, instead of local politicians.

“They’re coming after this first ring, fairly poor suburb like we’re made out of money,” said Ramona Anderson, a sales manager who also canvassed dozens of neighborhoods. “If they build it, great, but these people need to have a voice.”

Few saw the surge coming when the City Council voted 4-1 last month to replace the 1960’s vintage city library down the street from City Hall. After all, the city charter stipulated that opponents needed

and over that we are a poor community, can’t afford this and can’t afford that,” said Marlaire Szurek, Columbia Heights Library Foundation president at the meeting; “\$50 to \$70 a year increase in taxes, depending on the value of your home, is just too much, according to them.”

“This is the time for us to move on and do something. You are our representative democracy,” said Kathleen Collopy, a library card holder since 1955. “You are our representatives and you need to vote and represent those of us that want to see the city improved and advance community relations within the library.”

The petitioners faced a deadline of one month to garner more than 1,000 signatures. They got off to a slow start, going door-to-door. More than halfway through the drive, they switched tactics relying on the run-and-gun strategy one supporter — Tim Utz, he of the min-van — had already employed to get on the 2014 ballot as a Constitution Party candidate for the state Legislature.

“You drive up, you find them, you grab them on the street and tackle them, not really, and say, ‘Hi, sweetie, how are you doing? Do you have just a second?’” said Anderson.

Some 1,300 residents did take a second to sign, including many who support both the library and the taxpayers’ right to vote.

“What’s really noticeable is there’s a huge independent streak that’s strong right now, and it’s the strongest I’ve seen since we had Jesse Ventura run for governor,” said Davis.

To be on the safe side, the self-styled community organizers delivered the 131-page petition to City Hall before the July 28 deadline. City officials still need to validate the signatures on the petition before it’s official, even as the organizers planned to continue signing up more supporters over the weekend.

“With what they submitted, at first glance, it does appear to be enough signatures. But we need to verify all those against the county records, that they’re registered voters, and that’s the process we’re in right now,” said Katie Bruno, Columbia Heights city clerk.

Mission accomplished apparently, but there’s still plenty of campaigning to do — and not only for the referendum. Two members of the petition organizing committee will be on the ballot this November, as well. Greg Sloat hopes to become a city councilman, while Bob Odden will vie for Minnesota Secretary of State as the Libertarian Party candidate, both hoping for a boost from the local groundswell over the library.

signatures from 10 percent of the 10,100 Columbia Heights voters in the 2012 election to force a fall referendum.

“I’ve received quite a few text messages in favor of it from a couple of people who can’t be at the meeting tonight,” said Columbia Heights Mayor Gary Peterson at the outset of the decisive June 23 meeting. “But they expressed their support, which is kind of unusual. You usually get the other kind.”

Supporters dominated the public forum, outnumbering opponents at the podium 4-to-1.

## CANDIDATES NOW FILING IN 2nd ROUND FOR LOCAL OFFICES Filing Period Ends August 12 at 5 pm

For local races where a primary was not required, the candidate filing period began July 29 and continues through Aug. 12. Candidates will have until Aug. 14 to withdraw their name from the ballot if they so choose.

The following cities in Anoka County are filing candidates for mayor and city council seats during this period: Andover, Bethel, Centerville, Columbus, East Bethel, Ham Lake, Hilltop, Lexington, Nowthen, Oak Grove and Spring Lake Park. Linwood Township will have two Town Board seats and the Treasurer position for election.

Two school districts are taking filings for school board seats: Centennial ISD 12 and Forest Lake ISD 831.

The North Suburban Hospital District has three of its six seats on the general election ballot (Blaine, Fridley and Hilltop) and candidates can file for these seats at those respective city halls. The seats are now held by Rebecca Trancheff, Gerald Maeckelbergh and Janice Shear, respectively.

In other election news, the Lino Lakes Charter Commission approved a question to be put to voters on November 4th — asking if the city should be split into four wards, represented by city councilors, while the mayor’s seat would be at-large. Elk River ISD 728 will have two levy questions on the ballot requesting over \$100 million. Linwood Township will ask voters if the Town Clerk position should continue to be elected or appointed by the town board. A reverse referendum in Columbia Heights is likely though not yet confirmed by city officials at press time.

Shortly before this issue went to press, Rep. Jim Abeler announced that he has been endorsed by former Sen. David Durenberger for his run for U.S. Senate.

## CANDIDATE STATEMENT

### BOB ODDEN

#### Secretary of State

I am very pleased with the petition effort to give voters in Columbia Heights a more meaningful election when they go to vote. As a candidate for Secretary of State, encouraging referendums to provide more significant ballot choices is one way I plan to increase voter turnout.

Then for the voters to make their decision there needs to be an increase in healthy discussions on policy, particularly in the media. This goes hand-in-hand with increasing voter turnout. For instance, the city Council wants to borrow \$7 million for a new library building. However, they have not picked an actual site for the building, there are no building plans drawn up, there’s nothing to tell us exactly what the library will include, there’s no realistic measurable goals and objectives for the library, and final costs including land acquisition are unknown.

The Council has already agreed that the \$7 million is not the final cost for the new library building. At one Council meeting, the City stated the cost would be approximately \$10 million without land acquisition costs. The voter should not be voting for a blank check but should know all the details before they are asked pay for a new library building, or for that matter, anything else.

Voters are beginning to see themselves as ATM machines to politicians and lobbyists. The state legislature has bonded for a \$1 billion Viking stadium, \$90 million office building for the over the top egos at the MN Senate, and an increase in almost all taxes including taxes on products and services.

Government likes increasing business taxes. When the cost of goods and services goes up, it looks like the fault of the private sector, and that “requires” government intervention. All of these increases have happened because of a lack of meaningful checks and balances that remain to citizens.

What have the biggest supporters of the new library building done about the decrease in personal incomes after taxes for people to survive on? Nothing. They have not contacted our representatives in the MN legislature to express any displeasure with our representative’s willingness to increase tax burdens or express any displeasure in our local papers. Nor have they expressed displeasure at how the money is being spent. So at the council meeting when library supporters told the others to, “Buck up, it’s just a few more dollars,” what do you think the others thought?

Citizens need a way to protect themselves and providing meaningful elections is one way. I intend to make our elections more meaningful, even for judges, as Secretary of State. If bonding for the new library building is placed on the ballot, and people feel that a new facility is worth the cost, they can vote yes. If voters decide that they can’t afford another tax increase, then through this check on endless government spending, they can feel good about having at least some control over their lives.
