

Col Hts City Council reaffirms its decision to borrow \$7 mil REVERSE REFERENDUM SET FOR COL HTS ELECTION

During its August 11 meeting, the Columbia Heights City Council voted 5-0 to reaffirm its decision to borrow up to \$7 million to build a new city library. The decision was made by passing Ordinance 1615, on a 4-1 vote, at the council's June 23 meeting. In the meantime, the ordinance was challenged by a petition signed by residents who want to rescind the ordinance and the decision of the city council.

The question of whether to rescind the ordinance or let the ordinance stand, will be the focal point of the general election in Columbia Heights on November 4th. Two council seats and the mayor's seat will also be on the ballot, as well as state offices.

The petition effort required 1,010 valid signatures to be delivered to the city clerk within 30 days after publication of the ordinance in the city's legal newspaper.

State law requires the city clerk to report to the city council on the sufficiency of a petition within ten days after the petition's deadline. Such was the purpose for it being on the agenda at this meeting. The council had the option of reaffirming their previous vote, or by simple majority could have voted to rescind the ordinance.

The council's action reaffirming its vote sends the matter to the general election.

City Clerk Katie Bruno, in a council meeting packet memo, reported the petition was sufficient, with 1,034 signatures validated through the state's voter registration system. An additional six people contacted the clerk to have their signatures removed from the petition. A total of 1,371 signatures were obtained by the petition group.

The council spent about a half hour on this matter and most of the discussion from the public came from the petition group.

A Library Task Force member, Nile Harper, who has made a number of speeches at city council meetings in

favor of the library project, said the Task Force was in support of reaffirming the council vote. He urged people to vote in favor of the bonding issue in the election. Upon that, councilman Bruce Nawrocki asked Harper how he was going to be voting, inferring that Harper is not a resident of the city, but rather of Fridley. Harper shot back and admitted he is not a city resident, but said he lives "50 yards from the border," is a long-time resident who pays taxes in the Columbia Heights school district and shops in the city. Nawrocki reminded him that school district taxes aren't going to contribute to the library. Harper continued his testy response by pointing out there are thousands of people who hold a Columbia Heights library card who do not live in the city.

Petition group accused of collecting signatures by deceptive means

A city resident, Daniel Honigs, 4762 Stinson Blvd., said he had been approached by a signature collector while in his driveway. He said the person asked him "are you for a new library?" and he responded that he was. According to Honigs' testimony at the council meeting, the signature collector replied, "then you should sign our petition." Honigs said assuming that people are honest, he signed the petition, "and no, I did not read it."

Honigs stated, "I do think it was deceptive... how those signatures were obtained... I assumed what they were portraying to me is exactly what would have been on their petition... although I couldn't understand why there would be a petition for a new library since I knew that the bonding issue had already passed. I sign a lot of petitions that people bring up because they're gung-ho for something that's already a part of law and they want more people to be a part of it."

Honigs said he didn't know he had made an error by signing the petition until he saw "the newspaper article,"

EMMER ROUT SMASHES SIVARAJAH'S TRAVEL PLANS TO D.C.

Former state legislator and 2010 gubernatorial candidate Tom Emmer enjoyed an easy win Tuesday in the primary election.

His bid for the Congressional District 6 seat now held by retiring Rep. Michele Bachmann, has only one more hurdle — the general election.

Emmer, the Republican Party-endorsed candidate, was challenged in the primary by Anoka County Board chair Rhonda Sivarajah.

The congressional district's boundaries encompass parts of eight counties, totaling 279 precincts.

In CD 6 as a whole, Sivarajah managed to find 26% of the vote to Emmer's towering 73%.

Emmer had 19,557 votes in the district, while Sivarajah had 7,125. A total of 26,682 votes were cast for the two Republican candidates. CD 6 has over 389,000 registered voters.

Emmer's opponents in the November 4th general election will be Joe Perske, the DFL-endorsed candidate who received 10,070 votes in the primary with no DFL challenger, and John Denney, the endorsed Independence Party candidate who received 467 votes with no intra-party challenger.

(a letter to the editor published in the *Northeaster*) then made a call to the city clerk to have his signature removed.

One of the petition group, Bob Odden, 1201 42½ Ave. N.E., read letters directed to the city council from two residents. In each, the writers explained they signed the petition and described what its objective was, to show they had understood the petition's goal.

Odden added that both letter writers were upset by the manner in which city officials have handled the library project.

Library Task Force letter to newspaper called into question

Odden then expressed exception to a letter that was published in the August 6th edition of the *Northeaster*, a Minneapolis newspaper that reaches into Columbia Heights. The letter was signed by the chair and vice chair of the Library Task Force. Carefully crafted not to make direct charges, it said, "there have been numerous comments from people who thought they were signing a petition to support a new library without realizing the true purpose of the petition was to reverse the council's decision... (if) you feel that you signed the petition as a result of misinformation, we strongly encourage you to contact (the) city clerk... by 4:30 p.m. on August 8."

Nawrocki asked city attorney James Hoeft about the August 8 deadline as stated in the newspaper. "Where did that (the date) come from? Was it proper? Not proper?"

Hoeft said the letter was not from city administration; "I'm assuming the people put a date in there that recommended people contact the city by a certain date so that the city would have it before the council meeting."

The *Record* researched this point and could not find any provision in the city charter, state statutes or Minnesota Rules that specifies a time frame and process for accepting requests to remove signatures from a petition. We did find some other cities' charters that had a time frame identified but not the specific process (whether another signature is required, must the request for removal be done in person, or is a phone call acceptable, etc.) The *Record* inquired to the city clerk as to whether anyone from city administration had designated the deadline given in the letter. The answer was no. An effort to clarify with the Library Task Force chair David Larson, who was a signatory to the published letter, was unsuccessful.

Nawrocki said he took exception to the Task Force's accusations and showed the audience the petition form and read some of its content, as he had done at a previous meeting. He reiterated that the petition language seemed pretty clear to him. Nawrocki also noted the newspaper published the letter in its August 6 edition, two days before the deadline date given in the letter. (The newspaper however was posted online late August 4). He said this did not give time for a letter of rebuttal. *Editor's Note: A news article that may have made inquiries to city administration about the matter was not included in this edition of the Northeaster. Only the letter was published, and given the headline "Library petition: A chance to correct misinformation."*

Petition group member Greg Sloat, 4731 6th St. N.E., made remarks stressing that library project proponents were wrongly making the library the issue. He and fellow petitioner Tim Utz said the size and magnitude of the project warrants a vote of the city's residents. Sloat also wanted it be known that people who have been involved with the petition effort come from all sides of the political spectrum and many who signed the petition are in favor of the borrowing for the project. All have agreed that the decision should be put to the voters. Sloat said the referendum process is a safety valve built into the city charter "to keep a group of select insiders from controlling a process that should be decided by all of the people."

Councilor Donna Schmitt revealed she had spoken that day with Anoka County Board member Jim Kordiak who represents Columbia Heights and Fridley. She asked him to describe a scenario where the county would be operating a library in Columbia Heights. Schmitt reported, "he said we would not have a new library at all. Absolutely not. There's a waiting list of libraries in the current system right now..."

Schmitt went on, espousing the same points that have been made by other city officials — points lacking substance but wave a flag of loyalty and pride.

(For the record, Fridley, Lino Lakes and Coon Rapids have been discussed as possible future locations for new or remodeled libraries within the last couple years. However, the County Board's interest at this time is to add more locker locations, a concept that has proven to be successful at the Andover YMCA. The county's library board meetings are often covered in this newspaper.)

A presentation from library staff recognizing library volunteers, many of whom were in the audience, was given at the beginning of the meeting. Keen observers of the televised council meetings have told the *Record* that library staff have been making many more appearances at council meetings over the last year than had been made previously.

Sivarajah was not able to carry her home county of Anoka, as she garnered 43% of the vote there. 9,461 Anoka County voters cast ballots in the Republican primary.

CD 6 voting for Sivarajah by county:

In the statewide race for U.S. Senate, the Republican primary had five candidates,

with Mike McFadden receiving 53% of the Anoka County vote, and Jim Abeler taking 40%. The other three candidates, David Carlson, Patrick Munro and Ole Savior split the remaining vote.

Abeler did not seek re-election to his State House seat in Anoka's District 35A, opting for a run for U.S. Senate. Statewide, he received 15% of the vote and McFadden had 72%. The Republican-endorsed candidate for the 35A seat, Abigail Whelan coasted

to a 80-20 split against challenger Justin Boals. Whelan will move on to the general election to face Paul Perovich (DFL).

The District 5 seat of the Anoka County Board was on the primary ballot. Reid Oines was eliminated from the field of three, taking 12% and 349 votes. Andover mayor Mike Gamache placed first with 1,367 votes and 49% while former state senator Debbie Johnson had 1,068 votes and 38%. They will face off in the general election — incumbent Carol LeDoux did not file for re-election.

The at-large city council seat in Ramsey attracted four candidates, which triggered a primary there. Eliminated were Thomas Towberman and Terry Hendriksen, who received 7% and 18% of the vote respectively, while the top two candidates move on to the November ballot: Kristine Williams (682 votes, 40%) and Wayne Buchholz (579 votes, 34%).

Two Coon Rapids city councilors will be the candidates for the mayor's seat in the general election. Jerry Koch received 34% (1,309 votes) and Ron Manning had 23% and 896 votes. Coming in third place was Ted Schmolke with 654 votes. There were seven mayoral candidates; Mayor Tim Howe did not seek re-election.

Two other Coon Rapids council seats needed primaries: Ward 3's two winners were Wade Demmer and Ethan S. Yang, and Ward 5's top two vote-getters were Brad Johnson and Valerie A. Weaver. They will face each other in the general election.

Jason King and Matthew Knutson will move on to the general election for the Ward 3 seat in Blaine, as third candidate Karen Varian was eliminated, 20 votes behind second place Knutson.

There were no surprises in the primary election results in Columbia Heights, as eight candidates sought the top four spots. Incumbent Donna Schmitt placed second in the primary. The top vote-getter was John Murzyn, with Catherine Vesley in a distant third place, and Gregory K. Sloat trailing far behind in the fourth spot. The four candidates will battle for two available council seats in the general election.

In Ham Lake and Oak Grove, the endorsed candidates carried the Republican primary, with McFadden, Emmer and Jeff Johnson, the gubernatorial candidate, all winning those cities.

Statewide, the Republican primary had five gubernatorial candidates, with Johnson victorious by nabbing 30.3% of the vote; Kurt Zellers came in second with 23.9%, Marty Seifert with 21.1%, Scott Honour placing fourth with 20.8% and Merrill Anderson, 3.8%. The DFL primary saw Gov. Mark Dayton take 93% of the vote, with Bill Dahn and Leslie Davis capturing the rest.

For the Secretary of State office, only the DFL and Independence Party had contested races. In the IP, Bob Helland defeated David A. Singleton 52%-48%; and in the DFL the endorsed candidate Steve Simon, a State House member from St. Louis Park, managed just 43%. Simon was challenged by perennial candidates Dick Franson, a former alderman in Minneapolis, and Gregg Iverson. Each received about 29% of the vote. In many areas, Franson outpolled Simon.

Simon and Helland will face GOP candidate Dan Severson in the general election.

Another widely-watched race was the DFL battle for State Auditor between incumbent Rebecca Otto and Matt Entenza. Entenza sent numerous mailings to voters but it did not pay off as Otto beat off the primary challenge 80%-20%. This result was mirrored in the Anoka County DFL vote as well. Otto will go up against the GOP's Randy Gilbert and the IP's Patrick Dean in the general election.

The only contested race for Attorney General was in the Republican column: state senator Scott Newman fended off a perennial candidate from St. Paul, Sharon Anderson, 63%-37%.

Besides Mike McFadden leading the pack for the Republican side, Independence Party voters determined Steve Carlson to be their U.S. Senate candidate, and incumbent Al Franken easily fended off a challenge from Sandra Henningsgard, who received 5.5% of the DFL vote.

Preliminary estimates from the Secretary of State's office put the statewide primary election turnout between 12 to 13%. A full report, analysis and statistics of the August 12 primary election will be featured in the next edition of the *Anoka County Record*.

Candidacies filed for city and school district offices will also be reported in our next edition. The second wave of candidate filings for local offices was completed August 12. — ACR staff

Paying a city council member \$20 or \$30 bucks an hour will just encourage careerism.

The second argument contains no merit whatsoever and the most specious.

These mayors and councils don't "manage" the budget or any other aspect of city government.

Given the statutory framework of city government in Minnesota, it is staff that run the city and not the council.

For better or worse, the city manager/administrator and other senior staff make these decisions.

At best, the council and mayor ratify staff decisions. At worst, they rubber stamp them.

To suggest that there are mayors running around the suburbs with spreadsheets and big calculators is laughable.

Let's remember that this argument works in reverse. Remember salary caps on government employees in Minnesota?

The largest complainers were local units of government, who argued that the needed to pay a city manager \$150,000 or \$200,000 per year because of all the big responsibilities they had.

It's also similar to the arguments they make to hire well-heeled lobbyists.

The bottom line is that mayors and council members aren't really in charge of their cities and thus don't deserve to get paid like it.

Finally, the Watchdog isn't aware any cities that have suffered some kind of brain drain because the job doesn't pay a king's ransom.

The cities seem to run pretty well and don't seem to have trouble finding people willing to serve.

How ironic that Blaine Mayor Tom Ryan is the among the prominent whiners for higher pay.

He's been in the mayor's chair for over 20 years.

The "low pay" to which he feels he has been subjected for the past two decades hasn't seemed to dissuade him from holding on to the mayor's sash and refusing to let others have a turn.

There is nothing wrong with some form of reasonable compensation to recognize the commitment involved in serving.

That moderate pay shouldn't, however, turn into a salary and thus a career choice.

Promoted as a worker safety law, fine applies even when workers are on vacation

Starting August 1, 2014, motorists who speed through a work zone will be fined a minimum of \$300. This law replaces a previous law which simply called for fines to be doubled in work zones, which sometimes resulted in lower fines. Work zones typically have speed limits posted 5 to 25 miles below the regular posted limit.

The proposal was originally brought forward in a February legislative hearing. At the time, it was supported by Rep. Ron Erhardt, DFL-Edina, Rep. Mary Sawatsky, DFL-Willmar, and Rep. Frank Hornstein, DFL-Minneapolis. It eventually was packaged into a larger bill which was passed by the legislature and signed by Governor Mark Dayton.

“Many work zones are in place across the state, and many workers are in those work zones improving our state’s transportation system,” said Charlie Zelle, Minnesota Department of Transportation commissioner. “This law is important because it provides added protection in areas that can be vulnerable to careless drivers.”

While the law was promoted as a worker safety law, the fine applies when workers are not even present, due to the way the law was written. Lt. Eric Roeske of the Minnesota State Patrol stated, “Based upon my interpretation the increased fine would apply at all times.”

The fine would apply nights, weekends, and times when work crews are on holiday vacation. It would also apply in work zones which may not have seen worker activity for days or weeks.

Responding to the concern about the broad application of the law, Kristin Kammuehler of the Minnesota Department of Transportation stated, “This new \$300 is a way to not only keep workers safe, but also motorists. The majority of crashes that occur in a work zone cause injury to the driver. We hope this fine is a way to encourage motorists to slow down in work zones all the time.”

The new law can be found in Minnesota Statutes 169.14, Subd. 6a.

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Anoka woman charged with tax crimes

ST. PAUL, Minn. – The Minnesota Department of Revenue announced that the Anoka County Attorney’s Office recently charged Sea Thor Vang, 33, of Anoka, with four tax-related felonies.

Vang is charged with four counts of filing fraudulent income tax returns for tax years 2008 through 2011.

According to the criminal complaint, Vang included false information on her tax returns by overstating the amount of withholding taxes and underreporting income.

The complaint also states Vang received more than \$26,000 in refunds for these years, to which she was not entitled.

 ORDINANCE NO. 14-14**
 An Ordinance relating to Shade Tree Damage, repealing Article 11-1400 of the Ham Lake City Code and replacing same with a new Article 11-1400.
 Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Ham Lake, Anoka County, Minnesota, as follows:
 1. Article 11-1400 of the Ham Lake City Code is hereby repealed.
 2. There is hereby adopted a new Article 11-1400 of the Ham Lake City Code, to read as follows:

ARTICLE 11-1400 SHADE TREE DAMAGE

It is the intention of the City of Ham Lake to make reasonable efforts to preserve and protect certain species of shade trees that are threatened by various pests or diseases. These species include the Ash Group (Fraxinus species — White, Black and Green — Ash trees that are affected by the Emerald Ash Borer); the Elm Group (American Elm, Red Elm, Rock Elm, Siberian Elm and Chinese Elm); and the Red Oak Group (Red Oak, Pin Oak, Northern Pin Oak, Scarlet Oak and Black Oak). These three groups may be collectively referred to herein as the "Target Trees". The specific tree damages that are addressed are damage caused by the Emerald Ash Borer; Dutch Elm Disease, and Oak Wilt, sometimes collectively referred to herein as "Target Damage".

11-4000.1 Annual Inspection Period The City shall conduct an annual inspection in the month of July of each year of the City's trees from the Ash Group, the Elm Group and the Oak Group, by drive-by inspections from public roads. The inspection shall be carried out by a tree inspector or inspectors certified by the State of Minnesota (the "Inspector").

11-1400.2 Inventory of Damaged Trees As inspections are made, the Inspector shall take note of all Target Trees that show visible evidence of any Target Damage, recording the street address of such conditions and taking photographs where feasible.

11-1400.3 Notification to Property Owners

A. Ash Damage or Dutch Elm Disease. Where these types of damages are observed, the Inspector shall notify the owner of the property on which the trees are located of the conditions that were observed. Notification shall be by US Mail, and shall include the following information:

- 1) A description of the conditions observed;
- 2) A suggested method of action that may be taken by the owner to treat the damage or to prevent the spread of the damage, if any such treatment or protocol is in fact available.

B. Oak Wilt. Where Oak Wilt is observed, the Inspector shall notify the owner of the property on which the trees are located of the conditions that were observed. Notification shall be by US Mail, and shall include the following information:

- 1) A description of the conditions observed;
- 2) An offer to make a further inspection of the property, with the owner's permission, for the purpose of identifying and marking all trees on the property that may be infected with Oak Wilt.
- 3) Educational information about remedial measures, if any, that may be taken by the owner to treat the disease or to prevent the spread of the disease, if any such treatment or protocol is in fact available.
- 4) Educational information about any City programs that are available to financially assist property owners in treating or removing diseased trees;
- 5) Educational information about the availability of the use of a City-owned vibratory plow to prevent the future spread of Oak Wilt;
- 6) Educational information about the City's "no-cut" policy as described in Article 11-1400.4 hereof.

11.1400.4 "No-Cut" Period No person shall cut, trim or otherwise wound any Red Oak Group tree between April 1 and July 15 of any given year, unless the person has obtained a Permit from the City.

Permit Permits may be issued to any person with approval of a certified tree inspector engaged or employed by the City where the Inspector, in his or her sole discretion, deems that the cutting, trimming or wounding of the tree does not present a significant danger of the spread of Oak Wilt. Permits so issued may contain specific requirements or conditions to observe in the activity. The City may impose a fee for such permits, and if so, the permit fees so collected shall be placed in a dedicated fund to re-forest areas on public or private property that have been affected by Target Damage.

B. Violation Any person who violates the provisions of the "No-Cut" period or who violates the conditions a permit issued in connection therewith shall be guilty of a petty misdemeanor, punishable in the manner prescribed by Minnesota Statutes for that offense level.

11-1400.5 Other Assistance or Educational Programs

A. Dissemination of Information City staff shall use the City's website, any periodical published with civic news or any other media to provide educational or informative information about Target Damages to the general public.

B. Financial Assistance Program The City Council may, by resolution, establish and amend from time to time a financial assistance program to help property owners in need to deal with Target Damages. Funds for such a program may come from any lawful source.

11-1400.6 Tree Commission

The City Council hereby establishes a Tree Commission. The composition and duties of the Tree Commission may be established and changed from time to time by resolution of the City Council. Until and unless such a resolution is adopted, the Tree Commission shall consist of the members of the City's Park Commission, and may operate under the name "Park and Tree Commission". The Tree Commission shall advise the City Council from time to time on matters affecting Target Trees, in addition to such other duties as may be established by resolution.
