

Citizens band together to warn residents of chicken stampede

A small group of concerned citizens gave the New Brighton City Council a civics lesson on May 12th.

This group put together and distributed a flier informing citizens of an impending vote on a new chicken ordinance.

The flier called the proposed ordinance very weak, with no funding for enforcement. It called for an outright ban on chickens or strong regulation. The flier listed assorted drawbacks to having chickens and other birds in a residential area. It urged citizens to call their Mayor and council members.

The strategy worked. More than 150 people showed up. Some 40 people spoke and most strongly objected to having chickens in a suburban area, wanting to protect property values. There were also concerns about public health, noise and odors.

Three of the council members appeared stunned.

They cited months of work and process. What they had not counted on was that the majority did not want chickens at all. Many who attended the public forum said this was the first they had heard of the issue. Were it not for the flier, they would have never known.

Among the testifiers were some highly credentialed citizens with environmental or poultry science backgrounds, who warned of heavy pollution of the Rice Creek watershed with any expansion of urban farming and its increased bird waste. Disposal of dead animals was discussed as well as the possibility of clogging the sewer system with sand if birds were moved indoors and residents attempted to dispose of waste in toilets.

This testimony must have swayed the Mayor. He called for a resolution for staff to create a new ordinance banning birds and fowl altogether. Mayor Jacobsen, council members Gina Bauman and Paul Jacobsen (reversing himself) voted for the resolution. Councilmembers Mary Burg and Brian Strub voted no.

Did you know?

- Up to 18 chickens could be allowed per household with a coop structure of up to 10' x 20'.
- Property values will be affected. You may not be able to sell your home at full value, if at all, with chickens in your neighborhood.
- Chickens tear up lawns. If your neighbor has chickens, you'll be looking at their dirt, not green grass.
- Potential spread of various diseases such as *histoplasmosis* -- affecting both humans and pets -- has been completely ignored by the task force and the draft ordinance.
- Odors and noise will not be addressed.
- There will be no funding for enforcement, no registration and no license or permits required. Enforcement by the Code Compliance Inspector will be based only on neighbor complaints, not inspections.
- Chickens will attract other undesirable animals such as foxes and other predators.
- If passed as currently written, New Brighton will have the most liberal chicken policy in the metro area.

Call These Councilmembers and the Mayor Immediately...

The time for unrestricted farming in this area was 100 years ago. Not today. New Brighton is a quiet, low crime, residential community. Most people take pride in keeping up their properties. The majority would like to keep it that way. If you agree, you must have your voice heard now.

In mid-2013 neighbor complaints about chicken-raising reached a crescendo. Instead of direct action, the City decided to form a task force. The urban farmers were combative and single-issue focused and repeatedly made false accusations to tarnish the reputation of New Brighton. At the first public forum they rallied many non-residents who were actually allowed to speak. The voices of local residents were gradually drowned out. Now, three of the council members as well as the mayor have allied with the combative urban farmers.

Also please understand that if Councilmembers don't listen to you, there is an election coming up. You can eliminate two of the councilmembers who want New Brighton to go to the chickens.

Councilors outraged by citizen flier

Prior to the forum, those who distributed the flier were subject to harassment. Councilmember Brian Strub allegedly chased down a white-haired older lady, demanded to know her name, took her picture, and

pressured her to reveal who was behind the flier. She revealed nothing but her name. Other volunteers had similar stories of being pursued by chicken defenders.

During council comment, Gina Bauman said she received more than 100 calls and 95% of them were against chickens. She also received complaints that other council members could not be reached, possibly because they turned off their phones or would not reply to messages. She thanked the people for getting involved.

Councilmembers Burg and Jacobsen complained at length about the flier, claimed inaccuracies and misquotes (none proven), and leveled harsh criticism at the type of persons who would distribute such a flier.

They did not get the irony of an overflow crowd hearing this. Their logic seemed to be "How dare you citizens get involved in *our* process?" Burg and Jacobsen are up for election this fall, which was noted in the Chicken Alert flier.

While there's no telling how the chicken issue will play out, it will almost certainly be a factor in the upcoming election.

Anoka County Library Board briefed on fines, missing materials and the 2014 annual report

Nearly one-third of all registered library card holders in the Anoka County Library system owe some kind of a fine.

Many of them are only a dime or two, but 43 individuals have outstanding fines of over \$800.

Staff presented a report to the library board at its May 18th meeting.

The report showed that about 31% of the county library system's 272,808 borrowers owe money, which Library Board member Melanie Keister thought was a high number to have.

About 70% of the 84,000 borrowers who have unpaid bills with the library, have outstanding accounts of \$10 or less. Another 16% have bills in the \$10 to \$25 range, while 12% are between \$25 and \$100.

272 persons have outstanding bills between \$300 and \$800, plus the aforementioned 43 who are over the \$800 mark.

The board discussed the argument of materials retrieval versus monetary gain by collecting fines. There was a consensus of agreement that it was more important for the library to retrieve missing materials.

The collection agency hired in 2013, Unique Management Services, has been paid just under \$29,000 during that time and has successfully collected to date over \$41,000 in cash fines and materials valued at over \$102,000. The county library system retains loss and fines records for seven years and has calculated the retail cost of still outstanding materials (from 2008 through 2014) at \$393,000. The losses amount to an average of under 1% each year.

The Anoka County Library has a limit of \$10 in accrued fines or 20 or more items overdue as a cut-off point where the patron's borrowing privileges are frozen until the materials are returned or the fines are paid down below \$10. When fines hit a \$25 threshold, the account is sent to the collection agency. Unique Management has been given over 3,200 delinquent accounts to date.

Library Director Marlene Moulton Janssen noted during the meeting that

Final Report on the 2015 Legislative Session

The final day of the regular legislative session was last Monday. Consequently, this will be the last update of the 2015 session. Below is a summary of the 2015 session business.

Of the bills I carried this session, there are six that I would like to bring to your attention:

SF 1726 (White Bear Lake regional plan)

This bill addresses the larger water management issue in our region. First, while it is important to address the declining aquifer issue, we believe it needs to be done smartly. The DNR & Met Council have proposed drastic changes that will cost hundreds of millions of dollars. The problem needs a comprehensive solution involving the entire metro area not a piecemeal approach. This legislation will streamline the process and include the entire metro region. This bill is in the Environment and Natural Resources Finance bill and awaits the signature of the Governor.

SF 271 (Dyslexia tutoring income tax credit)

Currently, there are 137,000 students in Minnesota with dyslexia who are not getting the sufficient public school instruction to overcome their challenges. This bill would provide tax credits for parents who need to go outside the public school system to obtain dyslexia tutoring for their children. This would be a temporary funding mechanism until a better alternative can be found.

Although this bill did receive a few hearings this session, it was not included in the final Senate Tax bill. Here is a link to my Senate floor speech that provides my thoughts on the decision to omit this bill: <https://youtu.be/xZLYoMGtHoM>

SF 1224 (E-12 tax credit and deduction increase)

This bill would increase the education tax credit and deduction numbers because they have not been increased in years. Not only does this bill increase the tax credit and deduction, it also includes an inflation adjuster provision so it will not need to be readjusted in the future. This tax credit increase would allow parents to have greater control over their children's education. Although this bill did get a hearing in the tax committee, it was not included in the Senate Tax bill.

SF 434 (Minnesota math standards postponement)

This bill will delay the adoption of new math standards for five years. By doing this, a great deal of local and state money will be saved and the Common Core standards will not be considered. This bill is in the Education Finance bill awaiting the signature of the Governor.

SF 1748 (Bond funding for Wargo Nature Center in Lino Lakes)

This bill would provide \$3.14 million for repairs and upgrades. It will be considered for inclusion in next session's bonding bill.

SF 278 (Dyslexia policy provisions)

Among other things, this bill includes codified language for the definition of dyslexia. This legislation did pass and was included in the Education Omnibus bill.

Omnibus Bills

As I have mentioned in the past, we have been working on reaching a compromise between the House of Representatives and Senate versions of omnibus bills. Below are the omnibus bills we moved through the legislature:

E-12 Education (HF 944) — Provides for a spending increase of \$1.3 billion from the last biennium for an 8% increase. Of that increase, \$283 million was added to the per pupil formula which equals 1.5% in upcoming school year and 2% the following year. Additionally, \$31 million was designated for existing school readiness rather than the universal preschool, which the Governor insisted on including at a significantly increased cost. 1.8% increase per year for government bureaucracy was included. The bill did not contain any equity reform on the school pupil formula. I did not support this bill.

Taxes — With a \$2 billion surplus going into the session and \$1 billion of that surplus remaining at the conclusion of the session, a tax bill did not move forward. I believe we missed a great opportunity to provide tax cuts for hardworking Minnesota families and small businesses. Like the Transportation issues, it is anticipated tax issues will be discussed again next year.

Judiciary (SF 878) — Fully funded the court system and the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension, but reduced the funding demand by the Minnesota Department of Human Rights. Included gun rights legislation and did not include voting for felons who are no longer incarcerated. This bill also regulates the Automated License Plate Readers that help police with criminal investigations.

Higher Education (SF 5) — \$220 million added to higher education programs. Of that, \$135 million added to the Minnesota State Colleges and Universities System (MnSCU). Additional funds were also allocated for Alzheimer's research.

Transportation (SF 1647) — Negotiations between the House and Senate broke down over the proposed gasoline sales tax, a measure that I do not support. As a result, this "lights-on" bill provides basic funding for transportation purposes.

Agriculture/Environment (HF 846) — Eliminates the Pollution Control Agency Citizens' Board, creating a more comfortable environment for businesses and cities seeking permits from the PCA

in the future. The most prominent aspect of this portion of the budget is the buffer strips provision. I opposed Governor Dayton's initial buffer proposal, but, after changes, I am more comfortable with the final buffer zone language for the following reasons:

- DNR has no decision making or enforcement power; that authority moves to the Soil and Water Conservation Districts, the MN Board of Water and Soil Resources, and the counties.
- Money from the Clean Water Fund (Legacy) will be used to pay for program costs.
- Rather than 50 feet along ditches, an agreement of 16.5 feet was reached and agreed to by various farm organizations.

Health and Human Services (SF 1458) — Spends \$1.28 billion more in FY 16-17 than the previous biennium for an 11.5% increase. When the Healthcare access fund is included which was also spent, the increase reaches almost 15% for the next biennium. In addition, spending increases built into this bill for FY 18-19 are expected to reach 18.8%. Nursing home facilities did receive some additional money which was crucial to them, but there was no reform to MnSure. I did not support this bill.

State Government (SF 888) — 1.8% increase per year throughout all state agencies and funded the new Senate Office Building. Also gives authority to counties to contract with private CPAs to conduct audits rather than requiring they be done by state auditor.

Job and Economic Development (HF 1437) — I saw this 93 page bill for the first time approximately one hour prior to the constitutional legislative deadline. I did not support it.

Legacy (HF 303) — The Senate did not receive this bill from the House prior to the constitutional legislative deadline. Consequently, the Senate did not take it up and it was, therefore, not passed.

Even though there were a number of good, bipartisan initiatives that were enacted during this session, I continue to be concerned with the level of state spending while Governor Dayton has been in office. The state budget passed in 2011 was \$34.3 billion and this year's budget is \$42 billion. That is a staggering \$7 billion or 20% increase over a four year period! This level of spending is unsustainable and needs to be rolled back.

Thank you to all who have contacted me at any point this session, as you have played an important role in assisting me to better represent you. I sincerely appreciate all of your thoughts. DÉJÀ VU, ALL OVER AGAIN

Well, here we are again, Watchdogs. Despite months and months of legislative activity, taxpayers once again stand at the precipice of a special session and the possibility of a government shutdown.

As this edition goes to press, legislative leaders have reached agreement on spending targets for only a small number of the major programmatic spending areas that must be agreed to before conference committees can negotiate a conference report, have it assembled, pass both the House and Senate, and get it to the governor for signature.

While spending targets have been agreed to in the areas of agriculture, environment/natural resources, higher education, and public safety/judiciary, major differences remained regarding K-12 education, health/human services, transportation, and taxes.

It would take a major feat for the legislature to complete its work before the constitutionally mandated adjournment date of Monday night.

Technically, there are some major bills that need not be done. Because the state is running a surplus, a tax bill isn't needed.

Nor is a transportation bill, which would leave that area at status quo.

The other spending bills need to be completed, or else funding would run out on June 30th, shutting down those areas.

Now, the Watchdog doesn't care so much if government shuts down. It helps prove that people continue to live normal lives even if some bureaucrats are laid off and people can't get their driver's license renewed or check out a book at the library.

Part of the problem is that there is really no such thing as a true shutdown. Although this publication believes it to be unconstitutional, the Minnesota courts hold that they have the power to compel the legislature to spend money in certain areas of state government deemed "essential." Thus, there is no true shut down in any meaningful sense.

The other issue is that these shutdowns are never worth the political cost for Republicans. While some concessions may be won in a shut down that would otherwise have not been won, the majority of the public buys the DFL/mainstream media narrative that Republicans shut down the government that we just can't live without, not even for a day.

Yes, that's an irrational belief with no basis in fact. But so is electing Mark Dayton - twice.

It's just the way it is.

So while simply capitulating to Mark Dayton and the DFL Senate isn't acceptable, Republicans have to be realistic about attempting to reach a reasonable compromise and brokering an orderly end to the session, even if a brief special session is needed to tie up loose ends.

In negotiating that global spending framework,

Speaker Daudt must work to see that spending is aligned with inflation and population growth. Unchecked governmental spending untethered from any kind of economic metrics is a hallmark of Democrats. Job one is to keep their habit in check. In other words, Republicans need to be the adults in the room, keeping Johnny from running off with a bottle of whiskey in one hand and the keys to the car in the other.

Specifically, Daudt needs to deliver on a good portion of the GOP's \$2 billion in proposed tax cuts. Yes, some of that will need to be traded away in the 2 vs. 1 negotiations with the DFL.

Nonetheless, the DFL and Governor Dayton overtaxed Minnesotans by \$2 billion in their quest to satiate the endless appetite of their constituency groups for government spending and largesse.

Returning a portion of that money is a key promise that must be satisfied.

The other important priority is to keep HHS spending in check. Consumers of health and human services dollars are a key DFL constituency and spending in this area often outstrips inflation in increments that would make any college or university blush.

If you thought college tuition was on a trajectory to the moon, you aren't familiar with HHS, where spending has sometimes exceeded 30% in a single budget cycle.

Hopefully, Daudt and company can also do something to reign in MnSure, Minnesota's health insurance exchange that has been every bit as screwed up as the federal exchange.

In the HHS area, it appears that the GOP won't be able to hold on their plan to deal with the MnCare (not to be confused with MnSure) health program by transitioning beneficiaries to other programs.

The DFL is adamant about keeping this program even though its funding source will end in a couple of years.

You can see this one coming a mile away. Kick the can down the road until the DFL can claim a "crisis" and move for new taxes to fund the program.

Finally, in the area of transportation, it is imperative for the Speaker and his team to resist a gas tax increase and other taxes and fees. This is especially true for rumors that some sort of Metro-area sales tax is on the table for transit.

With an extra \$2 billion in hand, there is more than enough money for transportation, if it's made a priority.

Speaking of the gas tax and a sales tax, this publication finds it interesting that the DFL is so interested in pushing two of the most regressive taxes out there. For the uninitiated, a "regressive" tax harms the poor more than the rich, according to a metric called the "Suits Index," a widely accepted measure of how various taxes impact people based on their wealth and economic status.

Alcohol and tobacco taxes are also extremely aggressive and the DFL pushes for those as well.

Goodness, another DFL lie exposed. They're for the poor and downtrodden. Yeah, right.

It's almost as laughable as the DFL claiming that the gas tax is their number one priority.

If it was a priority, they would have passed a gas tax last year, when they ran the entire show. It appears rather clearly that last year's DFL priority was building themselves a \$90 million office building for the scant few months they spend in Saint Paul each year.

In addition to the policy issues at stake, the

Watchdog is deeply concerned about the process of these negotiations as well.

It is troubling to see these very important and critical negotiations disappear behind closed doors, away from the public and away from other legislators.

Clearly, the transparent and deliberative process of lawmaking is cast aside during these 11th hour, high-stakes negotiations.

It seems rather absurd that the taxpayers pay millions to have legislators, staff, and other overhead paid for months on end, only to have it come down to three men meeting away from the Capitol to decide the entire state budget for the next two years.

All those bills introduced, processed, and considered in committees, only to have it come down to a few sheets of paper.

In addition to being absurd, it's highly undemocratic and breeds suspicion and mistrust of our governmental institutions.

201 legislators are duly elected in Minnesota and all have an election certificate that makes all senators equal to their colleagues and the same over in the House of Representatives.

The two legislative leaders ought not to stand out so far from their colleagues in deciding these issues.

Moreover, this negotiating process is far, far removed from the process of lawmaking that governs during the normal course of business.

All bills are posted for public review. Floor sessions are televised. Floor proceedings are kept in formal journals posted online. Committee schedules are posted in advance. Those same hearings are open to the public. In fact, public testimony is accepted. Any citizen can come to a committee hearing and be heard.

It's not perfect, but it's a wonderful process unavailable to the majority of human beings, most of whom live under some form of tyranny and oppression.

This end-of-session process dishonors our collective principles and values regarding representative government.

This needs to change. A high priority for the next legislative session should be changes to this process to ensure that if these negotiations are needed to close out the budget, they should be done in a way that honors our lawmaking values.

To be clear, this isn't about the three leaders who happen to be where they are right now. This practice has gone on for years and both DFLers and Republicans have engaged in it.

Put another way, this isn't about these leaders and this isn't a partisan issue.

But these three have a chance to make things right next year.

We urge them to do so.

she felt reducing the amount of material that could be checked out on a card has helped reduce the number of lost items.

The library board voted some time ago to reduce the number of items that could be checked out on any library card from 100 items to 50.

Library Board member Robert Schiller, who represents the district of County Commissioner Matt Look (District 1), was surprised to learn of the 50 item limit and thought that was a large number. He wanted to know how people can carry that many items. Janssen said the patrons who often check out that many items are homeschoolers. Teachers also check out multiple copies of a book for classroom use.

The Annual Report, for 2014, was presented to the Library Board before being sent on to the County Board for approval. This year's edition focused on presenting profiles of library users and their "stories" — how they use the library and the meaning the service has for them.

There were 861,167 personal visits to a library building, however if online visits are included, the number about doubles to 1,689,974.

38,000 people attended over 2,100 programs.

Over 5,500 volunteer hours were logged, with an even split between adults' and teenagers' time.

As has been the case for the last few years, the ACL again was able to deliver services in 2014 for a per capita expenditure of \$23 per county resident. Funds expended came to \$7.55 million.

In contrast, the Columbia Heights Library, which is operated by the city while utilizing some resources of the Anoka County system, delivered services to its estimated 19,674 residents (per U.S. Census) for nearly \$42 per capita, on an \$810,000 budget for 2014.

Total circulation for the Anoka County libraries was just over 2.5 million. The Rum River library circulated 501,000 items, however Northtown's numbers were down due to it being closed for remodeling for about a quarter of the year. The three lowest in circulation were the branch libraries in Fridley (160,000), Ham Lake (81,000) and St. Francis (62,000).

The system's collection has over 600,000 items, of which 10% are E-books and E-audio items and 16% are CDs and DVDs. E-books accounted for 8.4% of the system's total circulation.

The total dollar amount expended for materials in 2014 was \$955,000. Nearly two-thirds of that figure was spent for printed materials, 21% on audio-video materials and 9% on E-books. ACL patrons asked for 15,518 items by ILL (inter-library loan), items which the ACL did not have and was able to retrieve from other library systems; and 13,734 items were lent by ACL to requesters outside of the system.

The library board also decided at the May 18th meeting to revive the Future Services subcommittee, which explores future technologies and uses of the libraries. Findings of this committee will be brought to the Library Board and County Board for any final decision-making. Library Board chair and vice chair Daniel Greensweig and Melanie Keister, and board member Ellen Ward will be on the subcommittee, as well as county commissioners Rhonda Sivarajah, Julie Braastad and Mike Gamache.

Beginning this week, the self-check out stations at the Anoka County libraries will also require the patron to enter a PIN number for added security.
