Trustees Conduct Interviews and Rank Applications

County HRA Approves Funds for Community Groups

Look Takes League of Women Voters to Task for False Statements

After a lengthy process spanning several meetings, the Anoka County Housing and Redevelopment Authority (HRA) has approved preliminary funding grants for community groups that provide services to county residents.

Every year, trustees of the HRA, which are the seven elected Anoka County Commissioners, distribute funds received from two US Department of Housing and Urban Development programs.

At a previous HRA meeting, every applicant was granted time to address the HRA about their request. Each applicant was asked to answer the same questions that were provided to them in advance. Each trustee personally scored every request based upon the applicant's answers. Two county staff members previously reviewed all applications and provided trustees with information on prior funding requests. After the conclusion of the presentations, staff blended together the rankings and prepared a final report.

At the final meeting in the process, the HRA reviewed the blended rankings. Following a staff presentation of the results, a hearing was held and public comment was taken. Trustees then discussed the process, results, and public comment.

All trustees felt that the rankings reflected the opinion of the group as a whole and found no reason to amend any of the grants outside of their ranking process. Amending any grant upward

Ho, Ho, Ho: \$300,000 in Taxpayer Funds for Jolly Green Giant Museum

It's the closest thing to handing government a blank check. The passage of a three-eighths cent statewide sales tax increase in the Clean Water, Land and Legacy Amendment in 2008 gives lawmakers hundreds of millions of dollars that must be spent every biennium by law.

This session lawmakers will hand out \$527 million raised by the sales tax. Most of the windfall goes to water, parks, trails and assorted environmental projects. The remainder—\$127 million this session—goes to arts and cultural heritage groups around the state.

The laundry list of lucky winners unanimously approved this week in the Minnesota House includes \$3.2 million for Minnesota Public Radio, \$500,000 for a Chinese garden for the city of St. Paul and \$750,000 for two statutes of the immortal race horse Dan Patch—one for the city of Savage, the other for the State Fair.

But the giveaway that towers over all the rest goes to the Jolly Green Giant. The bill doles out \$300,000 “to the city of Blue Earth to predesign, design, construct, furnish, and equip the Green Giant Museum to preserve the culture and history of Minnesota.”



For decades, the “museum” was a collection of memorabilia that anyone interested could check out in local resident Lowell Steen's basement. A few years ago, the city took over displaying the advertising icon's artifacts and Little Green Sprout memorabilia in the former fire hall, along with the world's largest Jolly Green Giant statue.

Nothing against the big green guy. After all, I worked several summers at Green Giant's canning plants in Cokato and Glencoe. But as American Experiment often points out, Minnesota can do better with your tax dollars.

Rep. Abigail Whelan**Highlights from Omnibus Bills**

• **Agriculture:** The agriculture budget addresses the needs of farmers and our agriculture community, focuses on growing our state's agro-economy industries, and creates a dedicated Pollinator Habitat and Research Account to research and help address our dwindling pollinator population.

• **Public Safety:** This bill is about keeping Minnesotans safe and giving law enforcement the tools they need. Included in the bill is an increase in penalties for illegal protests on highways, dedicated funds for additional sex trafficking prevention grants, as well as a provision I co-authored that creates stronger penalties and longer supervision for convicted sexual predators.

The provision on stronger penalties and longer supervision for sexual predators, HF 1572, specifically addresses a plea deal known as a "Stay of Adjudication." That is, if individuals who admit to a crime (in a plea agreement) are not convicted, the conviction does not stay with them.

This is a problem in Minnesota for current law allow stays of adjudication for individuals charged with criminal sexual conduct. Specifically, if an individual charged with a sex crime admits to the crime, and agrees to probation and sex offender treatment, the case is listed as pending during the time of probation and they receive a stay of adjudication.

As a recent investigation highlighted, these "stays" are a huge problem, for when a sex offender who received a stay of adjudication moves into a community, individuals in that community are not notified of past criminal sexual conduct. This has led to grave concern for there have been multiple cases where individuals who received stays of adjudication have re-offended.

• **Higher Education:** This bill works to put students first and address college affordability. For two and four year MnSCU schools there are tuition freezes and reductions. It also extends a counseling program to help Minnesotans manage their student loan debt payments.

Notably, in the Ways and Means Committee an amendment was added that strengthens oversight regarding the use of aborted fetal tissue research. It would require researchers at the University of Minnesota to seek approval for all aborted fetal tissue research through the Institutional Review Board or Stem Cell oversight committee. It also requires the University to submit a report to the legislature on aborted fetal tissue.

• **Legacy:** The Legacy bill contains appropriations to the four Legacy funds: Outdoor Heritage, Clean Water, Parks and Trails, and Arts and

Cultural Heritage. It includes more than \$100 million to restore and protect water across the state. This money is constitutionally dedicated for these specific purposes. The bill passed in the Minnesota House with a vote of 131-0.

• **State Government Finance:** The focus of this bill is to increase efficiency, accountability and transparency in state government, while limiting growth, hiring and spending. Notably, there is a provision that addresses a program called "gainsharing." As a recent news article states, the program "has morphed into a state worker achievement bonus" (<http://minnesota.cbslocal.com/2017/04/05/gainshare/>). The bill requires a report to be issued monthly to legislature for increased oversight. It also protects funding for our veterans programs to help those who have honorably served our nation.

• **Job Growth and Energy Affordability:** This legislation fights to lower energy costs for Minnesota consumers by streamlining the regulation process for energy providers, and reinvests funding from ineffective programs into clean energy programs that better serve Minnesotans. There is also a provision in the bill that creates a pilot program to increase competitive employment opportunities for youth in Anoka County focused on career guidance and job training.

• **Health and Human Services:** The HHS bill includes a number of provisions that prioritize our state's most vulnerable citizens. I bill I carried to require reporting on abortions via telemedicine (which I explain more below) is included in the bill, and the repeal of MNsure. Here are some of the highlights:

- The first rate reduction in 17 years, targeted to low-and-middle-income Minnesotans.
- Includes conformity to a tax law called "Section 179," which encourages main street businesses to grow and expand by letting them expense equipment purchases differently.
- Reduces taxes on social security income.

- A new student loan tax credit to help graduates with high student loan debt.

- Includes my Opportunity Scholarships plan, which helps give parents of low-and-middle-income, the opportunity to send their kids to a school that meets their needs. This program does not use any money from the state treasury and is similar to the Pre-K AWARE Plan.

Finishing our budget work on time

This week we passed the last of ten budget bills off the Senate floor. This is the earliest that has happened in years. When we said we were frustrated with the status quo, we weren't just referring to policies; it also means we're frustrated with the way government operates. We set early deadlines so you can hold us accountable to do things differently, and this week we kept our promise by finishing our work ahead of schedule. Here is a recap of all our budget bills.

- Our public safety bill spends \$2.2 billion on public safety and corrections, keeping Minnesota communities safe is a top priority.

- Our \$3.7 billion transportation bill delivers funding to rebuild or replace roads and bridges across Minnesota without raising taxes.

- The Senate Republican K-12 education bill invests \$18.5 billion into our schools over the next two years – a \$1.1 billion which is a 6.5% increase. It emphasizes making sure children can read by third grade, and includes improvements to the way we instruct students with dyslexia.

- Our \$3.17 billion higher education bill increases funding to the State Grant program for financial aid, and freezes tuition at Minnesota State schools. It also provides crucial funding to encourage medical breakthroughs, like spinal cord, traumatic brain injury, and advanced cancer research.

- Our health and human Services bill increases funding for programs focused on helping people with disabilities develop life skills, caring for the elderly, and ending the cycle of poverty for at-risk kids. It also increases pay for PCA's.

- Our agriculture finance bill makes sure Greater Minnesota economies are set to thrive for years into the future.

- Our jobs bill focuses on public-private partnerships to promote job growth and connect skilled workers to new opportunities.

- Our environment budget cuts out wasteful and redundant spending but continues our commitment to Minnesota's natural resources and recreation.

- Our state government bill starts the process of slowing government bureaucracy growth, but increases spending for critical government functions like cyber security and amber alert infrastructure.

CAPITOL UPDATE

Greetings, loyal readers. It's been a week of strong activity at the Capitol, with much to report.

As this edition is disseminated to your inbox, the House and Senate have passed all "omnibus" appropriations bills off the floor of each body, with the exception of the House's Health and Human Services (HHS) spending bill. That bill will be debated and passed today.

Starting this evening, the legislature will move into break until April 17th.

Watchdogs, this break period is an excellent time to contact your legislator and let them know that you expect them to fight for limited government and individual liberty.

Over the break, many legislators will hold town hall meetings or attend other public events.

This is your opportunity to check in with your state Representative and senator.

If you don't know who represents you, shame on you. You're failing your civic duties. But you can find out right here.

Next, go to your legislator's web page and click on "town hall meetings."

With omnibus bills passing each body, the legislature will come back after the break to establish conference committees to work out differences between the House and Senate bills and reach agreement with conference reports.

After those conference reports are passed in each body, they will be sent to Governor Dayton, where they will become law or be vetoed.

They conventional wisdom is that they will be vetoed, setting the stage for a second round of negotiations, this time between legislative leaders and the governor, with the hope that these negotiations will conclude with budget bills that pass before the session ends in late May.

Otherwise, Minnesota will be looking at another special session and possible shutdown situation.

What's interesting, however, is that many of the omnibus bills passed the House and Senate with bi-partisan support, some with strong bi-partisan support.

For example, the House Agriculture Finance bill passed unanimously.

In fact, every Senate omnibus bill passed with DFL votes.

It will be hard for the governor to craft a credible alibi for vetoing "extreme" bills based on "alternative math" when DFL legislators voted on the record for those bills.

Moreover, this publication finds it just a bit ironic that the governor labels any legislative spending bill with "fuzzy math." After all, he was the guy who built a \$1 billion football stadium with those "e-pull tab" revenues that fell short by 95%.

Stay tuned.

BONUS BUFFOONERY

If it's a new month, there must be a new Dayton administration scandal, once again revealing his administration's contempt for the taxpayer.

In this month's scandal, the Office of the Legislative Auditor (OLA) is investigating the administration's possible abuse of an employee bonus program, known as "Gainsharing."

Essentially, the program is designed to provide a financial incentive to these employees to find savings in state government. The theory goes that once those savings happen, the employee will share in the efficiency "gain" by getting a financial cut of that gain.

Thanks to the work of state Rep. Jim Nash (R - Waconia), it appears that the program has become little more than an employee bonus program.

One state employee, for example, received a bonus for "above and beyond performance. all with a smile."

Many of the gainsharing bonuses failed to quantify any savings.

Amazingly, Dayton's appointee in charge of overseeing the program, declared that "it's not possible" to document actual savings.

OLA chief James Nobles, who will oversee the investigation, rightly observed that, "You're supposed to be able to demonstrate, document that there were actual savings."

Another month, another scandal.

FAUX OUTRAGE

A legislator who has been on our Watch List for many years, state Rep. Melissa Hortman, has made the national news this week.

Hortman, in a move of admittedly political genius, manufactured outrage when she took to the well of the Minnesota House to "call out" her Republican white male colleagues for allegedly ignoring DFL women of color when those women were speaking.

During debate on the House floor, Hortman was recognized and rose to declare, "I hate to break up the 100% white male card game in the Retiring Room." She went on to bemoan the "wonderful" and "passionate" speeches that were "ignored."

Give us all a break. Please.

On any given day, the floor of the Minnesota House is abuzz with all sorts of activity, especially on long days with many and complex bills on the agenda.

Not every legislator is going to be sitting for hour upon hour in rapt attention, waiting for another liberal legislator, not matter race or gender, drone on and on at the microphone.

In what may be the best retort of the year, Rep. Greg Davids (R - Preston) wryly observed in the aftermath of the faked outrage, "First of all, the speeches weren't that good. They were amazingly repetitive and boring."

Bravo, Rep, Davids.

Legislators may leave the floor to meet with

colleagues, visit the Senate floor, visit with governor's staff, or meet with constituents, some of whom drove many hours to see their legislator.

And yes, these legislators also need to take a break on occasion to eat, rest, or even visit the biffy.

While Hortman's stunt is pennywise, it may also turn out to be pound foolish.

For the same reasons just listed, many DFLers will likely want to be absent from some portion of floor debates moving forward.

That's too bad.

Rest assured, the GOP will be there, cameras on, ready to film the empty seats when GOP females themselves are speaking.

When Republicans are speaking, there better be 57 DFL butts in 57 DFL chairs, respectfully listening.

Otherwise, Hortman's stratagem will be revealed for what it really is.

would have required a reduction in another grant, as the level of overall funding is fixed. It was noted that federal funding at this point in the process was a conservative estimate and that additional funding may become available. Additional funding would be allocated based upon the ranking process. Trustees unanimously agreed to adopt the report and funding recommendations as presented.

Trustees Applaud Process

HRA Chair Scott Schulte thanked his fellow trustees for their work. He said, "This is a burden that we don't have to take on. We could easily say staff handle this and bring it to us when you are done. All of us could work in the background and get other things done and not be a part of this. But it's not right. We should be a part of this, because we are allocating tax dollars to public service groups that need the money, so we should be a part of it."

Trustee Rhonda Sivarajah spoke highly of Anoka County working with community partner organizations, instead of spending the funds internally with county staff as is done elsewhere. She also spoke of the open process that now exists, noting that when she first was elected, the person who controlled the meeting could steer funding to their favored organizations.

Trustee Jim Kordiak appreciated the engagement of his fellow trustees. He stated, "This impacts all of our communities and connects all of us."

Public Hearing

Robert Edwards, representing the Lee Carlson Center for Mental Health and Wellbeing informed the HRA that they would be willing to accept partial funding. They had requested \$30,000 but were awarded \$0. Staff noted that from 2012-2016, they had been awarded \$125,860.

Connie Moore, representing Alexandra House, thanked the trustees for their funding recommendation of \$156,160 which will be used to replace nine furnaces, expand a parking lot, and add fencing and other security measures.

Becky Fink, representing Nucleus Clinic, asked for reconsideration of their grant request for \$68,500 which was not funded. Staff noted that from 2012-2016, they were awarded \$45,000 over two years. It was also noted that they received a \$44,196 grant from the Minnesota Department of Health.

Dee Ann Christensen, representing the League of Women Voters, questioned the openness of the process. In an accusatory tone of voice, she raised concerns about how the community could see or evaluate any of the discussions. She wanted to know where discussions took place. She wanted to know what community notification was done.

Look Takes LWV Member to Task for False Statements

Trustee Matt Look pointedly addressed the accusations made by the League of Women Voters representative. He noted that this was the second meeting that he has heard them claim that the elected officials do not conduct government business openly.

Mr. Look said, "It is a common thread I hear over and over and over that I wasn't aware of this information or this meeting, and I wasn't even here. Well if you are not here at a meeting, you are probably not going to be informed, plain and simple."

Speaking directly at Ms. Christensen, Mr. Look stated, "But then to take it from that step and to say that you are not being transparent, is misleading people. I'm calling you out Dee Ann, I'm sorry I don't agree with you. This has been very very transparent. And you can continue to come up if you want to and make reference to the fact that we are not transparent, but because you say it does not make it true. You pushed me to my limit. I'm sorry I am going to respond to you directly. I understand that you are very interested in trying to prove lack of transparency. You will fail in doing so."

Funding Sources

Funds are distributed from either the the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) or the HOME Investment Partnership Program (HOME). These programs are targeted towards citizens or community projects that benefit those of low or moderate income.

CDBG specifically targets affordable housing, prevention or elimination of slums or blight, or other health and safety community development needs.

HOME program is designed to create affordable housing for low-income households. Funds can be used for grants, direct loans, loan guarantees, rental assistance, or security deposits. - *ACR*

CITY OF HAM LAKE ORDINANCE NO. 17-05

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING A PORTION OF CHAPTER 9 OF THE CITY OF HAM LAKE, COUNTY OF ANOKA, STATE OF MINNESOTA.

The City Council of the City of Ham Lake does hereby ordain as follows, pursuant to Chapter 9, Article 1050 of the Ham Lake City Code.

That the zoning classification for the following described property situated in the City of Ham Lake, Anoka County, Minnesota is hereby designated R-1 (Residential Single Family) (Hidden Forest East).

The land referred to herein is situated in the State of Minnesota, Anoka County described as follows:
