

## Field Increases to Six as Mayor Enters 2018 Governor's Race

### Woodbury Mayor Joins Current Candidates at Brainerd Lakes Chamber Forum

In November 2017, Woodbury Mayor Mary Giuliani Stephens announced her run for Governor and will be seeking the Republican endorsement.

Giuliani Stephens has served as mayor in Minnesota's ninth largest city since 2010 and is a graduate of the University of Michigan and William Mitchell College of Law. As a mayor and councilmember, she has served the citizens of Woodbury for the past 12 years. She also serves on the board of the Woodbury Area Chamber of Commerce.

##### Question on Workforce Training

**Moderator:** The biggest challenge facing Minnesota businesses is finding qualified workers. Our state demographer tells us that this is going to be the case for the — at least the next decade. How would the state help to solve this problem under your leadership as governor?

**Phillip Parrish:** Well, you know, there's some conflicting information here. You know how many universities and education settings are in this state? A lot of really good ones, right? Now why is it that the demographer cannot find well-educated, well-trained people? Is it the focus that's wrong? Are they training in the wrong area? Are they not paying attention to the needs of the community?

So these are questions that all of us have to start asking and engaging. What on earth is going on here? Do you know the millions of dollars we're spending, sometimes daily, in education? And you're telling me the demographer can't find workers? I had

a great conversation earlier regarding workers and not being able to find workers and not being able to get to locals. I just want to offer one anecdote.

Several years ago, and as a Navy officer and Navy enlisted as well, I didn't hesitate moving six months, a year, having to do a job and do it with a

## Favored Newspaper in Col Hts & Fridley Loses 75% of Circulation from 2017-18

### Fridley Scrambles to Justify \$8,000+ Annual Payments for Public Notices

A lot of laughter in the office this week at *Anoka County Record*. Our predictions came true better than we had imagined.

In 2017, the *Columbia Heights / Fridley Sun Focus* announced that free distribution of newspapers to every household was ending. In its place would be a mail only subscription plan which would require readers to submit a signed request form every three years.

Where the *Sun Focus* train wreck was heading should have been of little surprise. Most people find little value in newspapers tossed in front yards on a weekly basis, unless you happen to own birds and need cage liner from time to time. In this day and age of digital theft of personal information, one would have to be somewhat insane to voluntarily give a weekly newspaper their personal information and then allow them to track their viewing habits online. Their grand plan as I saw it was to collect your personal information on an ongoing basis and then use it for marketing purposes against you.

In the City of Fridley, the *Sun Focus* subscription model has led to what appears to be roughly a 75% drop in circulation of this newspaper in their city. As noted in city council documents, in 2017, they claimed 8,292 copies were reaching 74.6% of the homes in the city. In 2018 they stated that the number had dropped to 1,998 copies. The drop was so embarrassing that city staff failed to tell the council that their favored newspaper now only reaches 18% of the homes in the city.

The facts strongly suggest that the majority of Fridley residents never wanted the *Sun Focus* tossed in their front yard in the first place. It appears that readership in general was never noteworthy and the attention paid to city public notices was miniscule. It turns out that the readership of the *Record*, with just shy of 1,000 subscribers, was not much different than that of the *Sun Focus* even though Fridley city leaders tried hard to state otherwise.

That the *Sun Focus* is Fridley's "favored" newspaper raises another point that drew laughter in our office. Mayor Scott Lund has bent over backwards trying to justify how taxpayers should be paying this newspaper over \$8,000 a year to publish public notices when the *Record* offered to publish them for free on more than one occasion. Lund claimed that everyone read the paper, that the notices were seen by everyone, etc. During his time as mayor, he has voted to pay the *Sun Focus* over \$100,000 to publish public notices. Clearly he thought this was a great use of taxpayer funds. Now the numbers show how foolish and meritless his actions have been.

In 2018, the staff report tries to downplay the numbers. Instead of bragging the vast readership of the *Sun Focus*, now they state that they simply meet legal requirements and let's focus on that instead of the money. When Mayor Scott Lund or City Manager Wally Wysopal come crying to the legislature about how they have to spend all this money to publish public notices and only reach 18% of the residents, I will remind both of them how they turned down our offers to publish their notices for free.

joyful heart and make sure my family was okay. And, sure, we missed each other, but there was more to do.

**David Osmek:** Well, when it comes to the education system, the reason we're not finding educated people for jobs is because we're making people — the kids feel like failures, because if they don't go to a four-year university, we just stigmatize them that they're not getting a good education. We have great educational opportunities, both in our community colleges and technical institutions, that can actually give them better jobs, in many cases, than you would in a four-year university.

We also have to start getting kids to understand that going into a hard work field, such as a welder or sheetrocker, going into trades, they actually will pay to train you and actually provide you a better job than you might get coming out of the university being a multicultural university professor or whatever. You know, we've got lots of different fields that you could go into, and we shouldn't pigeonhole kids to prepare them to go into just a single pigeonholed area. We have to train them and get them better jobs through technical schools, and I think that's one of the solutions, is to focus more on those schools.

**Jeff Johnson:** So I think part of this is just a training deficit, and I think government certainly can play a more active role in making sure colleges and technical schools are working with business leaders to make sure our kids are getting the skills that they need to succeed, but I agree with Dave. There is something much bigger going on here, and it is this philosophy that if a kid doesn't go get a four-year degree, they are somehow not successful, or they're somehow a failure. I see that all the time, and I think that's so sad.

I think that the governor should be using the bully pulpit to advocate for technical training and for trade schools and for apprenticeship programs, and we should be so proud of these kids who make that choice, because they're not doing what society tells them they have to do. They're doing what's right for them, and they're serving a real need in the state of Minnesota right now. We should be celebrating these kids, and I will as governor.

**Mary Giuliani Stephens:** A good workforce is an educated workforce. We have to put our kids first, and that means providing options, and I agree, and one of those options has to be good technical training, and that starts in high school. We also have to continue to leverage our partnerships, and Greater Minnesota is a perfect example, where the business community is partnered with the K through 12 and the two-year colleges, to provide pathways for our young people to get good jobs, good paying jobs in an economy that then provides those jobs with little or no college debt. In fact, the Brainerd Area Chamber has a program going on, and I wrote it down, it's the Bridges Workplace Connection, doing exactly that thing here in this community, providing outcome-based and value-based education. Keep up the good work in that.

We also have to really close that achievement gap, and I think that means bold leadership. If schools aren't performing, change the operators at the school.

**Keith Downey:** Well, for me, workforce and training issues, while important, are a symptom of a broader problem. We have the public sector crowding out the private sector in Minnesota. We are a net-out migration state. We lose more native Minnesotans than other states that move here from other states. That is a deficit that is caused by the economic policies of the Democrats and the Dayton administration. We change that, and we make Minnesota an attractive place to do business, to move a family and grow a family, and we reverse the fundamental trend that is causing the problem.

And I'm going to second what Mary just said. We have a cancer in this state, in the urban quarter largely, but other places too, and it's the education achievement gap. Literally, 50 percent of the kids that started in Minneapolis public schools in September in 9th grade, aren't going to graduate. And if you're a minority, it's 75 percent of those kids. That is an absolute outrage, and we need to change it. We can't be leaving that many thousands of kids behind in this state and expect that we're going to have a healthy workforce.

**Matt Dean:** This past week I just finished traveling around the state to 87 counties in 87 days. And I talked to lots and lots and lots of employers, and I asked, "What's your Number #1 issue?" And it's either healthcare and workforce or workforce and healthcare, over and over and over and over, from one end of the state to the other. And they're up against it, and they're competing, but they're not just, as Keith said, they're not just competing against other businesses. We don't have a zero percent unemployment. They're competing with the government that has a payment structure that pays people not to work.

They're also competing with people who are here illegally, and that's a problem, because it deflates wages for everyone else, and it causes competition, and it's unfair competition for people who live here and for people who were born here and for people who follow the rules. And Obamacare is the third one. There are so many rules that say if I get a promotion, if I get the next job, if I get this job, I will lose my healthcare at home. I will lose the benefit at home. We can't have businesses competing with the government.

### Question on Mining


**Moderator:** Mining has long been an industry in Minnesota. What is your position on mining?

**Keith Downey:** We can do it in an environmentally responsible way. Minnesota is one of the very few states that has their own environmental review law on top of the federal environmental review law, and a mine can actually get through that entire approval gauntlet and still be bogged down in legal challenges. So we've got to position our state for success. We can improve those mines and those pipelines,

## Opinion: St. Paul's Mayor Gets Off to a Bad Start

This is shocking: Melvin Carter, at his inauguration as St. Paul's mayor, went on an ill-informed rant against the National Anthem:

During his inaugural speech Tuesday, St. Paul mayor Melvin Carter III said he was honored to have a locally-born musician present at his own Central High School to sing the national anthem — with a big caveat.

"We cannot ignore the painful reminder, written into our anthem's third verse, of just how deeply injustice is rooted in the American tradition ... Our national freedom song is an ode to slavery," Carter said.

"This is the American paradox, passed from generation to generation, dating back to the noble group of rich white straight male landowners who embedded into our founding principles a yearning for a set of God-given rights they sought to secure for only themselves," the mayor added.

Carter is speaking from ignorance—about the Founders, and about the Anthem. With regard to the Anthem, he repeats a canard that has become popular among certain left-wing activists over the year or so. He refers to the Anthem's third verse, which is almost completely unknown (or was until leftists started talking about it). This is the relevant language:

*No refuge could save the hireling and slave  
From the terror of flight, or the gloom of the grave:  
And the star-spangled banner in triumph  
doth wave,  
O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave.*

Francis Scott Key merely describes the British forces as "hirelings," i.e. mercenaries, and slaves, which some of them were. (Some may have been freed slaves, too.) To claim that this makes the song an "ode to slavery" is absurd. Noting that some slaves fought for the British does not express an opinion, one way or another, about slavery.

Mayor Carter expresses the kind of divisive ignorance that we have seen far too much of in recent years. It is too bad that he has chosen to begin his tenure as mayor on such an inappropriate note.

and we can do it responsibly.

**Mary Giuliani Stephens:** We've been providing safe mining and pipelines forever in Minnesota. We have to continue to provide the jobs and understand that people will be responsible. With respect to the pipeline, they want to replace it. I mean, isn't that what you do when things are failing? You replace them. I don't know where they're coming from on that one, but mining provides good jobs, and miners protect the

environment, so I totally support that.

**Jeff Johnson:** I'm guessing you're going to hear the same thing in 30 seconds from all of us, but when you look at what's going up in the Iron Range, it is one of the areas that needs good jobs more than anywhere else in the entire Upper Midwest, and we have the opportunity to do that in an environmentally safe way. So we ought to be moving forward with it. And then the pipelines, it is just insane, because instead of running oil through newer pipelines, we're going to be running it on trains, which is much more dangerous. It's absolutely crazy. So we'll move forward with both.

**David Osmek:** I'm probably the only one up here that has a legislative record on this particular issue, because it never came out of committee. We stomped every time they wanted to stop pulling metals, and PolyMet was stomped into dust in committee. I'm absolutely in favor

of them. We have the toughest water quality standards in the entire world, not just the nation, the world, and if we can't do it here, we can't do it anywhere. And also, we have to tell the environmentalists that a byproduct

of copper mining is actually a chemical that you need in battery power, so if you wanted to have more electric cars, you should be protecting and encouraging copper mining in Minnesota.

**Phillip Parrish:** I want as many people as possible today, if you have social media, Twitter especially, if you connect up with the people — the good people up in Northern Minnesota, and you start reading up and tweeting and retweeting and posting and reposting their stuff. The biggest problem we have going on is not just a legislative thing at the moment. It's not just a governor-at-the-moment thing. We have agencies and a — and this entire government has been subverting laws and rules and regulations that have been on the books for years that do a good job just the way they work and how they are.

**Matt Dean:** A few months ago, Phil and I were in Virginia, Minnesota, and we heard from many folks from the city who want to save the North and the Iron Range. One woman said that her daughter, who was making over \$70,000 a year in the mines, she's got two little granddaughters, lost that job, now has a \$19,000 a year job with two service industry companies, with no benefits. That's the difference. The Iron Range in the state of Minnesota won the Second World War and helped build the major cities across the United States, and it can again have a big economic boon.

### Question on Local Sales Taxes

**Moderator:** The sales tax rate varies across Minnesota and has created a bookkeeping nightmare for small businesses. How would you fix the sales tax? Should we go to a uniform rate statewide, or should we allow more local control?

**Mary Giuliani Stephens:** You'll start with the mayor that has no local sales tax in her community. And what I've learned as I've studied this issue is it's political, so if you're an insider and your elected official has been in for a long time, and you can get it passed, you're going

to get a local sales tax. And so if you look at it, that's exactly what it is. It's disparate throughout the entire state. Some communities have it, some communities don't, some are higher, some are lower. So there's no uniformity in there. There's no consistency, there's no certainty for businesses.

**Jeff Johnson:** I would not like to support a statewide sales tax, but what I can tell you about local sales taxes, if they want to raise them based on what is already there, they should always have to have a referendum — no exceptions for stadiums, as we've seen lately, or a few other things if you happen to be in the in the right political place. I think it should be if you want local control, have it where people actually have the same.

**David Osmek:** Well, there already is a legislative process in place if you want to have a local options sales tax, and it absolutely does include a referendum. That's a requirement, unless, of course, the idiots of St. Paul decide to waive a referendum. I believe in local control, if they want to do that. They certainly have the ability to do it, and you get to vote, and if your city doesn't want to do it, then you vote no. So there's a process in place, like I said before, I want to erase those sales taxes in Minnesota all the way down to 5 percent and start from there, but we already have that process in place, and it's a good process as far as I'm concerned.

**Phillip Parrish:** Yeah, I think the common thread here is due process. If people have due process and are informed and can make good decisions and they can vote no, it creates disparity across the state, they'll do that. So let's make sure that people are informed and let's make sure there's a due process.

**Matt Dean:** The people who usually get hurt with this the most are the middle class, and middle class in large cities, by and large, are the ones that get hit the hardest. And, once again, we have to, as Republican candidates, we need to spread that message across the state of Minnesota, that the middle class needs to have responsible governance from the top down; otherwise, you're just going to keep getting it at the local level instead of the top level. We can make that argument, and we can win that argument statewide, and it's based on prosperity. I like that message, and I would take that message into Minneapolis.

**Keith Downey:** I agree, the process works. It favors local control referendum component attached to it, and, again, if the state comes in and mandates what every local unit of government can and can't do in this and every other area, guess what? Local government doesn't matter anymore. And they are the most accountable and the most local to you, the voters.

I will say, from the statewide perspective, though, we are high on taxes in everything. Where we really stand out is in the estate tax, the corporate tax, and the income tax and the statewide commercial and industrial property tax that no other state has. That's what we should tackle first.

### Question on K-12 Education Funding

**Moderator:** What is your position on funding education in Minnesota, pre-K through high school and higher ed? So they want to know how you'd fund the whole system. And then, secondly, How, as the governor, would you fix our failing schools? You can pick one or the other, or you can try both.

**Phillip Parrish:** Bottom line, all of our students — let's start at pre-K through 12 — all of our students need to be treated fairly. All of our students deserve the same treatment across the state. These schemes about coming up with, you know, one school district — the most recent formula directives with regards to how to fund a school. I mean, I specialize in school law and school finance, and I've read the most current ones, and I'm telling you what, it's darn near impossible to figure out where the heck you are going to end up in the district.

Treat all of our students the same — they all are deserving — and stop funding higher education to the tune of millions of dollars that are wasted on infrastructure and people that never touch a student's life.

**Matt Dean:** The first thing that the governor of the state of Minnesota should do is really look at the relationship between the federal government and the state government. What are we being told that we have to do that doesn't get paid for? Well, it's quite a bit. And I can tell you that the unfunded mandates from the federal government in the area of education and healthcare are, not surprisingly, our two biggest costs in the state of Minnesota. And we need to start protecting our state again from federal mandates, number one.

Number two, I don't know if any of you saw it, but the Center of the American Experiment has done a great job of exposing the "stuff" going on in the Edina School Districts that doesn't have very much to do with reading, writing,

or arithmetic. Our kids are bombarded with non—curriculum "stuff" that comes home in backpacks that has more to do with politics and social re—engineering than it does to do with civics, math, or science. We need to understand that and get control back over our curriculum, give it back to students, to their parents, and to their school boards and to take it away from the social engineers.

**Keith Downey:** Well, it's a personal one for me. My dad is a teacher, and I grew up raised by a bunch of teachers' families, and I look at what's happening with the teachers union and the fact that it's just a bargaining unit. I look at what's happening in these schools in the urban corridor that are literally failing their kids, and this education bureaucratic system is immovable. And so I think principle number one is we need to re-create choice. If you are the parent of a child in a school that is literally failing, you need to get a voucher to be able to go to the school of your choice.

The second thing is to cut ourselves off from that federal funding stream, short-term pain for long-term gain. And then the last thing is we have to have a governor who is not afraid to take on Education Minnesota. I am sorry, but they are a significant barrier across so many places. I look at my dad's once proud tradition, and I look at what's happening to them, and now, not only are they simply in it for the money and to protect their franchise, but they're actually an agent for this propagation, this left—wing propaganda, into our schools. It's really sad. We're going to

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have to have a governor who is strong. We have to care about all these kids.

**Mary Giuliani Stephens:** I think there's a lot we can do — more options. I said earlier, we've got to get this regulation into the 21st century. Our school districts are not independent school districts. They don't have choices. I've talked with the three that are over in Woodbury, and there are so many formulas, they have no creativity in doing that.

We need a pipeline that recruits and rewards great teachers. We need a no-nonsense governor that is going to look at that problem in our inner cities and that achievement gap and address it by requiring performance, and if there's not

performance, you know, there's lots of ways to change that and either get new operators, or I have some other ideas that I'm exploring, and I will share as well. But these are all things that we can do to make education better for all of our

students in Minnesota.

**Jeff Johnson:** So this comes down to a big principle, and it's more than just about K-12 education, but I'll relate it to that. Every decision that we make about K-12 education should be about what's best for the kid, not what's best for the school, not what's best for the teachers or for the union or anything else. I hear this all the time. When I talk about school choice, what's the response? "What's going to happen to the school?" And the answer is, "No, what's going to happen to the kid, and what's best for each kid?"

And so to me, somebody asked me the other day, "If you could wave a magic wand and do any really difficult thing in this state —" I said the one thing I would do or the first thing I would do is I would make every penny follow the child. Rather than funding institutions, we would fund the kids, and if the parents thought the best thing for that kid was to send them to their public school, that's fantastic. If it's a private school, just as fantastic. If it's home schooling, just as good. It's not government's role to make that decision.

Of course I understand that is waving the magic wand, and we'd probably have to start by dealing with the schools that are truly failing our kids, because it's really hard for liberals to argue against that.

**David Osmek:** Well, my answer is going to focus on hard issues, not philosophy. In K-12, we have things called school districts. They have election certificates just like most of the people that are here on the dais. They should be empowered to be incubators of change, but what happens in the state of Minnesota, is we in St. Paul think we know better than everybody else, so we start making rules. A prime example is the bullying law of 2014, I believe it was. Every school district already had laws in place, but then the state of Minnesota, in their infinite wisdom through their legislature and their governor, came up with their own remedy and idea for what you have to have for a bullying law. We didn't need it, we don't need it.

Now, second, on higher education, at the University of Minnesota in particular, we need to start focusing on Minnesota kids. We do not need to encourage and import kids from out of state. We need to be a land grant university, which is what we were set up for, but we have been focusing far too much on importing kids from other states and from other nations as opposed to making sure that we have the opportunities for our kids that are here in Minnesota. There should be some diversity, but we should be focusing on our kids first.

C. Placement. All single family dwellings shall be placed so that the apparent entrance or front of the home faces or parallels the principal street frontage.

D. Foundation. All dwellings shall be placed on a permanent foundation in compliance with the Uniform Minnesota Residential Building Code as adopted by the City of Ham Lake.


